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## PREFACE

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Volume 5 of the *Executive Journals of the Council of Colonial Virginia* continues, without a break, the journal entries in volume 4 of this series, which end with those for October 28, 1739, and carries the executive proceedings of the Council through May 7, 1754. The texts of these journals and of part of the appended proclamations are from photographic copies of the original manuscripts which were sent, in accordance with instructions to the colonial governors, to the home authorities in England and are now preserved among the Colonial Office papers in the Public Record Office of Great Britain, London. The texts of volumes 1-4 of this series were obtained mostly from the journals and proclamations in the Public Record Office and, to a lesser extent, from several surviving volumes of manuscript journals in the Virginia State Library.

Plans for completing the publication of the *Executive Journals of the Council of Colonial Virginia* were made by the present editor soon after the death, in 1934, of Dr. H. R. McIlwaine, former state librarian and editor. Although it appeared that the texts for volumes subsequent to volume 4 must come entirely from the British Public Record Office, it was most important, in any publication plan, to ascertain the existing sources (various check-lists of materials in that repository did not assure completeness) and to secure copies of them. Photographic copies of journals in the Public Record Office from February 1, 1726/27 to April 12, 1753, were available in the Virginia Historical Society, having been obtained by the late Mr. Fairfax Harrison in the course of certain historical investigations and afterwards presented to that institution. These photocopies had been used to some extent by Dr. McIlwaine in editing volume 4 for the purpose of noting discrepancies between the texts of journals sent to England and the corresponding texts of the journals to October 28, 1734, in the Virginia State Library. Incidentally, it might be mentioned that these journals, through the proceedings for April 27, 1731, were published by the Virginia Historical Society in its organ, *The Virginia Magazine of History and Biography*, volumes 32-37, with copious historical and genealogical notes which were continued into volumes 38-39.

Having no record of other extensive and acceptable (photographic) copy in this country, the present editor commissioned the late Dr. C. G. Chamberlayne, editor of several parish record books published by the State Library Board, to search in the Public Record Office during his

visit to England in the summer of 1935 for all executive journals of the colonial Council subsequent to the photocopies in the Virginia Historical Society, all proclamations subsequent to October 23, 1739 (the latest in volume 4), and important related material. He presented a detailed report which took into account also certain duplicate, but not identical, sources but he did not find journals to cover completely the remainder of the colonial period, nor many of the proclamations which had been issued. However, before an order for photocopies could be placed in London, it was discovered that the University of Virginia had just secured such copies of these journals in the Public Record Office from April 30, 1752, to June 17, 1774, corresponding to those reported by Dr. Chamberlayne, and these were borrowed and photocopied by the Virginia State Library. Photographic copies of the proclamations and of some related material noted by Dr. Chamberlayne were supplied on order by B. F. Stevens & Brown, Ltd., of London, a firm which has long served the Virginia State Library in making investigations of English sources and in furnishing therefrom copies of records of colonial Virginia. The Virginia Historical Society also lent its facsimiles for photocopying by the Virginia State Library.

Work in connection with the publication of the concluding volumes of the series had to be set aside, however, during the years devoted to securing a new State Library building and in dealing with the parallel problems of institutional reorganization, and it was not until late in 1941 that the actual editing of the material could be begun. It was noted in due course that there were serious omissions in the Virginia Historical Society copies, some being pages which the photographer in England might have missed, and one being the journal for an extended period. In fact, it had been generally assumed from notes in check-lists that the latter was non-existent since the journal for June 10, 1747-December 2, 1748, had been endorsed to show that no journal had been received from Virginia for the period between September 10, 1744, and June 10, 1747. Following up an indeterminate reference in one check-list, the editor had B. F. Stevens & Brown, Ltd., make an investigation of this as well as the matter of missing pages in the journal for August 6, 1742-September 10, 1744. Although such records had been evacuated because of war-time hazards, that firm was able to secure permission to examine specified volumes on account of the official request of the Virginia State Library. All of these matters were found according to the references (the journal had been filed apart from others of the period) and photocopies of them were secured.



However, it was not practicable, under war-time conditions, to make a general search in England for certain journals which are not recorded: between May 7, 1754, and June 10, 1756; between September 15, 1763, and September 8, 1767; and between various other dates which indicate lesser gaps, although journal extracts, scattered minutes, and other evidence indicate that the Council met as usual in these periods and kept records of its executive proceedings. In consequence, volume 5 ends with May 7, 1754, and the next volume must wait until after the war when a thoroughgoing investigation of records in various depositories in England can be made. It is quite possible that these journals survive, especially as duplicate copies of such records were often sent to England by the colonial authorities. It is also the case that June 17, 1774, is the latest date noted for these journals in the Public Record Office although minutes must have been kept locally to a later date, probably to the final collapse of the royal government in Virginia.

Of the nine journals represented in this volume, part of the first (through October 28, 1739) was printed in volume 4 of the series, the remainder, appearing here, covering the period, November 1, 1739-August 28, 1740. The other journals, in chronological order, cover respectively the following periods: October 16, 1740-June 11, 1741; October 15, 1741-July 26, 1742; August 6, 1742-September 10, 1744; September 13, 1744-May 7, 1747; June 10, 1747-December 2, 1748; December 8, 1748-August 29, 1751; October 15, 1751-April 22, 1752; April 30, 1752-May 7, 1754. It will be noted that these journals vary greatly in the portions of time to which they relate, apparently having been written up and transmitted at convenience. A foot-note at the beginning of each journal, as printed here, states the characteristics and the location of the original. Each manuscript journal is attested and signed by the clerk of the Council, but the texts of the journals vary greatly among themselves in style and legibility, having usually been written by different assistants.

In editing the texts of the journals in volume 5, account has been taken of surviving executive minutes of the period in the Virginia State Library. In the preface to volume 4 of this series, it was stated that the Council made a distinction between the minutes of its meetings, which were often hastily done in an unfinished state, and the resulting journals, which set forth the proceedings as final records. Whether or not the terms were always sharply defined and applied by the Council (the manuscript minute books now in the Virginia State

Library bear no original titles, and the Board of Trade in London was prone to refer to the transmitted journals as minutes), the evidence in this volume supports the above statement, and this distinction is moreover made, although with some errors, in *Calendar of Transcripts, Including the Annual Report of the Department of Archives and History*, published by the Virginia State Library in 1905, where the journals and minutes are listed separately.

The entries in the manuscript minute books are often rough, sketchy and almost illegible, showing many changes and corrections, and omitting some of the business at Council meetings; but some of them are as complete and clear as journal entries. Ordinarily, of course, the clerks would have at hand, in writing up the journals, both the minutes of the meetings and the various papers which had been considered by the Council. For this reason, minutes might be brief and inconclusive, omitting certain proceedings such as actions on land causes, etc. There are, however, important differences in the texts of minutes and journals: the former sometimes contain matters which do not appear in the journals; they are sometimes revealing in showing changes in original proceedings; they sometimes show variations from the journals in the order of entries; they sometimes indicate meetings which are either omitted or whose proceedings are included under other dates in the journals. Of course the journals carry greater authority, being the final and official record in which the clerks would presumably have embodied the proper corrections of the proceedings; however, it is quite apparent that the clerks made errors both of omission and commission. It was unfortunately true that the public records suffered much on account of carelessness and neglect. Even corresponding journals of the same period show serious discrepancies, having been copied presumably from the clerk's notes at different times by different assistants. (See volume 4, p. vii-lvii, for lists of important discrepancies between journals in the Virginia State Library, as printed in volumes 3 and 4, and those in the British Public Record Office). Since there is no original executive journal of the period of volume 5 in the Virginia State Library, it became all the more important to make a careful comparison between the photocopies of the journals in the Public Record Office and the extant minutes, and to set forth essential differences by foot-notes.

Five Council minute books in the Virginia State Library contain executive minutes during the colonial period subsequent to November 1, 1739, and it seems advisable to describe all of them here although only

the three which relate to the period of this volume of the *Executive Journals of the Council of Colonial Virginia* have been used in editing the present texts. These books, now restored and bound separately in boards, were formerly bound up with other matter in several large volumes which have, in recent years, been divided into their constituent parts. Judging from various Council books of the period, each of these minute books, which have no titles, may have originally borne a number (now lacking in most cases) in a system of notation. Although these numbers have no significance in any present classification, they have been included in citations, particularly in *Calendar of Transcripts . . .*, where the contents of the volumes in which the books were then bound are analyzed, albeit with errors and without distinguishing between executive and legislative minutes. Since these numbers have been variously used for identifying purposes, they are included in the general descriptions which follow.

The first minute book (termed "Journal", however, in *Calendar of Transcripts . . .*, p. 21) of the period under consideration is *Council Executive Minute Book, July 31, 1738-May 6, 1743* (title supplied, and cited hereafter in foot-notes as *Coun. Ex. Min. Bk., 1738-43*). This book, denominated "N<sup>o</sup> 14", has 85 pages of which three are blank (these pages appear to have been unnumbered originally but have, in recent years, been mostly numbered in pencil) and three pages originally numbered 3-5 in reverse order at the end (p. 1-2 at end are lacking). Varying from rough and sketchy minutes to full and fair proceedings, this book is devoted entirely to executive sessions, including certain proceedings which were omitted entirely in the journals sent to England.

*Council Minute Book, 1740-1747* (title supplied, and cited hereafter in foot-notes as *Coun. Min. Bk., 1740-47*) is devoted chiefly to the legislative minutes of the Council for several sessions of the General Assembly during the period indicated in the title but has some rough executive minutes for a few meetings in 1745-1747. Designated as number 23 in *Calendar of Transcripts . . .*, p. 35, the book has 90 pages of which two are blank and another bears only a few apparently irrelevant words (these pages seem to have been unnumbered originally but have, in recent years, been mostly numbered in pencil).

*Council Minute Book, 1748-1752* (title supplied, and cited hereafter in foot-notes as *Coun. Min. Bk., 1748-52*) is devoted mostly to the legislative minutes of the Council for several sessions of the General Assembly during the period indicated in the title but has some rough executive minutes for a few meetings in 1748-1749. It is designated as

number 18 in *Calendar of Transcripts . . .*, p. 35-36, and has a mutilated notation at the top of the first page which might have been "N<sup>o</sup> 18". The book is apparently incomplete since it begins with certain legislative minutes for November 2, 1748, whereas the session of the General Assembly began on October 27, 1748. It has 84 pages, of which five are blank and one bears only a few apparently irrelevant words (these pages appear to have been unnumbered originally but have, in recent years, been mostly numbered in pencil).

*Council Minute Book, 1755-1759* (title supplied) which is designated as number 22 in *Calendar of Transcripts . . .*, p. 36, has 82 pages (these pages appear to have been unnumbered originally but have, in recent years, been mostly numbered in pencil) of which 65 are devoted to legislative minutes of the Council for several sessions of the General Assembly during the years indicated in the title and 17 (reversed in order at the end, some unnumbered or incorrectly numbered in pencil) to rough executive minutes for some meetings in 1756-1759.

*Council Minute Book, 1759-1767* (title supplied) has 88 pages of which one is blank (these pages appear to have been mostly unnumbered originally but have since been largely numbered in pencil). This book is devoted mostly to the legislative minutes of the Council for various sessions of the General Assembly during the years 1759-1767 (pencilled numbers 16-77, 78-87, the latter group inverted and in reverse order) but has rough executive minutes for some meetings in 1760-1767 (numbers 1-15, blank page not counted, and pencilled numbered page 77). It is designated as number 20 in *Calendar of Transcripts . . .*, p. 23, 37-38, where the analysis gives the pencilled numbered pages 16-77 as "inverted", numbers 1-15 having been taken as the beginning of the book.

In 1906, the Virginia Historical Society undertook to publish in *The Virginia Magazine of History and Biography* the executive proceedings of the colonial Council, beginning in 1737, from the originals in the Virginia State Library. The contents of *Council Executive Minute Book, July 31, 1738-May 6, 1743* were published in installments in volumes 14-16, with the exception of most proceedings through December 21, 1738, which occur more completely under the corresponding dates in *Journal of Council From Aug. 5<sup>th</sup> 1737 to Dec<sup>r</sup> 21, 1738* (manuscript "N<sup>o</sup> 15"), the text of which was published in preceding order in volume 14. (This journal may have been considered a minute book by the former editor of the *Executive Journals of the Council of Colonial Virginia*, although the record, in spite of a few omissions, is made

up of full entries, since he indicated in the preface to volume 4 of this series that the latest manuscript journal in the Virginia State Library ends with the proceedings for October 28, 1734). The executive minutes in *Council Minute Book, 1759-1767* were published in volume 16 of *The Virginia Magazine of History and Biography* but the executive minutes in the other books mentioned above were overlooked, which is not surprising when one considers the confused character of the minute books themselves. It is also the case that the minutes which were published show many minor errors due no doubt to the illegibility of originals which are usually clarified by the comparative journal texts subsequently obtained from the British Public Record Office.

The texts of all proclamations in the preceding volumes of this series were obtained from the British Public Record Office. It is indicated in the preface of volume 3 that proclamations sent to England became proportionately fewer as the eighteenth century advanced because their importance as documents worthy of transmission steadily diminished in the estimation of authorities. At any rate, less than half of the proclamations given in the appendix to this volume are from the Public Record Office. It will be noted that all of these, except the last, were copied and transmitted as two units, apparently complete for their periods, the first including four proclamations dated April 3, 1740 to August 6, 1740, and the second, eight proclamations dated June 10, 1746 to April 6, 1747 (one in regard to a meeting of the General Assembly, referred to in the journal under June 15, 1746, seems to be the same as the proclamation issued under date of June 26, 1746). However, these proclamations were not filed with the journals in the Public Record Office and it is possible that others of the period may be discovered later.

In view of the apparent scarcity of proclamations in the British Public Record Office, the editor of this volume has investigated other likely sources and has included in the appendix copies of all of those of the period which he has been able to find. The source of each is given in a corresponding foot-note. Judging by references to them in the journals and by copies of a few which are not mentioned in the journals, the proclamations given in the appendix are less than half of those issued during the period. Although the student would be pleased to have all, the loss is probably not great since the purpose of most of the missing proclamations is stated in the journals; and many are practically duplicates, with dates changed, which gave effect to numerous decisions to prorogue or convene the General Assembly.

For the remainder of the colonial period, following this volume, and particularly for the later years, a greater number of proclamations are available, largely because of the existence of original manuscript copies in the Virginia State Library.

The absence of foot-notes in the preceding volumes of this series has made for a more expeditious publication of the texts of the journals but a certain number of foot-notes in this volume have seemed necessary as well as desirable for a proper correlation of the texts of journals and minutes, and for the elucidation of certain other matters. In the main, these foot-notes have been designed to clarify the texts, not to explain and interpret them. Notes of the latter character would have been extremely numerous, have required a great amount of time to produce, and have probably been of small value to the informed student.

The abbreviation of references to certain sources has already been noted. It should also be stated that, in citing *The Virginia Gazette*, from which many proclamations have been taken, the reference gives the last date of the weekly issue when this newspaper bears both the beginning and ending dates of the weekly period.

The style of the present volume follows very closely that of its predecessors. Although the printed edition of these journals does not, of course, reproduce the manuscripts in every respect, the utmost pains have been taken to have the text of this volume conform to the originals in all the essentials of accuracy. The handwriting of the various clerks who wrote up the journals varies widely in style and legibility but the originals present few difficulties on account of archaism and contain few symbols not readily represented with modern type. The arrangement, paragraphing, capitalization (the size and form of initial letters are sometimes conjectural), punctuation (or lack of it), and spelling of the originals have been preserved so far as practicable and determinable. However, the printed text omits the meaningless dashes or flourishes of the originals which often occur at the end of lines; represents the initial "ff", a form of capitalization, by "F"; renders the sign for "per", which is ordinarily used, by the word for which it stands; employs the short instead of the long form of "s"; omits dots under superior letters; and leaves out the curved mark (circumflex) often used over letters to indicate an omission (*e. g.* "Hoñble" for "Honourable"; "coñmand" for "command") or that "c" stands for "ti" (*e. g.* "mençoned" for "mentioned"). The forms "y<sup>e</sup>" for "the" and "y<sup>t</sup>" for "that" ("y" for "th"), which rarely occur, have been retained. In the case of proclamations, the words of unusual size and the many

italicized words which appear in the sources are not represented in this volume by differentiations of type; and the indentions in the sources, which show minor variations, have been standardized. Editorial insertions in the text are indicated by enclosure within square brackets. Since it is unnecessary and inexpedient to call attention to all clerical errors, "[sic]" has been used sparingly, and particularly to call attention to mistakes which might be considered editorial or typographical.

These proceedings of the Council relate to an important, although little known, period of Virginia history which saw nearly a decade (1739-1748) of warfare in which the American colonies of England, Spain, and France were involved in the conflicts of their mother countries; the circumstances leading up to the great French and Indian War; important treaties with the Indians on whom so much of success in war and diplomacy depended; the purposeful expansion beyond the Alleghany Mountains; and other notable developments. In their larger historical aspects, the proceedings show the various measures of the Council with respect to the wars in which the colony was engaged; the constant concern of that body with Indian relations; certain indications of the growth of the spirit of self-government; the increasing realization among the governments of the English colonies of the need for cooperation in the face of common dangers; the formation of great land companies with grants west of the mountains in territory claimed by France. The French and Indian War was greatly abetted by the westward expansion of Virginia, particularly the aggressive policy of the Ohio Company which was formed with the intention of blocking the French in the Ohio region and of extending English trade and settlements in the disputed territory of the West. The greater part of the Council proceedings, however, is concerned with the routine business of government which came nearest to the daily life of the people: the appointment of local officials, the location of courthouses, parish affairs, land grants, etc. The proceedings being a compendious record, few matters are given in much detail. One may wish that many references to affairs of large import should be more circumstantial but the historian of the period will probably have no great difficulty in determining their significance, especially as so much elucidating material (mainly copies of papers in British archives) is now available in various American libraries. However, since most of the original records which ought to be in Virginia have not survived, much amplifying information for these journals and for Virginia colonial history in general will not be readily available until copies of related documents (reports, letters and

enclosures, commissions, instructions, accounts, petitions, memorials, etc.) have also been assembled and published.

The editor of this volume wishes to make grateful acknowledgment of his indebtedness to the late Dr. C. G. Chamberlayne who investigated and reported on the sources in the British Public Record Office; to Dr. Harry Clemons, librarian of the Alderman Library of the University of Virginia, and the Executive Committee of the Virginia Historical Society, for permission to photoduplicate the photocopies of the journals in their institutions; to Dr. St. George L. Sioussat, chief of the Division of Manuscripts of the Library of Congress, who lent various related handwritten transcripts and had the collections in his custody searched for additional proclamations; and to Mr. R. W. Church, assistant librarian, and Mr. W. J. Van Schreeven, head archivist, of the Virginia State Library, for their assistance in locating and identifying various sources. He also wishes to express his appreciation to Miss Martha Winfrey, Miss Emily Terry, Miss Virginia Jones, and Miss Marjorie Connell, members of the staff of the Virginia State Library, who have given such capable and constant help in searching likely collections for printed proclamations, assembling information, transcribing, proof-reading, and indexing.

It was evidently written by an assistant to the clerk of the Council as the handwriting is different from the latter's attestation at the end. *Executive Journals of the Council of Colonial Virginia*, v. 4, includes the entries of this journal through October 28, 1739, beginning with two undated entries between December 21, 1738 (the end of the preceding journal) and April 21, 1739. The photographic copy shows no title or endorsements, and seems to omit the beginning of the journal, especially since a manuscript volume of the minutes, July 31, 1738-May 6, 1743 (hereafter cited as *Coun. Ex. Min. Bk., 1738-43*), in the Virginia State Library shows a meeting on February 20, 1739.

Brethren

I intended to have met you last Year, but the Small pox, a Distemper that has ever proved fatal to you, being then very rife in New York, I was fearfull that the Infection might be conveyed to you by some one or other; Curiosity generally leading many People From thence hither at the time of our meeting. In Tenderness, therefore, to you I put off our Interview to this time, and it is with much Pleasure I now see you, that we may brighten and Strengthen the Covenant Chain, that has so long tyed us in mutual Friendship and Brotherly affection, which I hope will continue inviolable to the End of the World, notwithstanding the Arts and Intrigues of our old Enemies, who leave no means unessayed to divide us; and take all occasions to weaken, and at length, to root out your Name and Nations; this the wisest amongst you know full well, but the ungovernable Passions of your youth often render your cooler and better Counsels Useless; Of this the frequent and almost constant practice of their joining the French Parties, who go out to destroy the distant Nations of Indians, with whom you have no pretense of Enmity is a flagrant Instance. Nor have the French any just Cause to Quarrel with them, for it is Chiefly to enlarge their Dominions, to bring Honest and Innocent Nations under their Power and Tyranny, and to make them Subservient to their unjust Views, that they make War against them; a Conduct very different from ours, who treat all those Nations of Indians, who are under the Protection of the great King your father, with Benevolence, Kindness, and Humanity, Studying to protect them in their Freedom, and wishing you all to increase in Number as the Stars in Heaven. Nor do we Seek occasion to extirpate [*i. e.* extirpate] Nations with whom we have made no alliance, No, on the Contrary, we unite them with us, we receive them with open arms, and use them with Kindness and Humanity, Suffereing them to Enjoy, that inestimable Blessing their Liberty without Disturbance. In this Difference of our Conduct and that of the French, may be seen

the Difference between Freedom and Slavery, Between Englishmen and Frenchmen; and you are too discerning not to see which of them is the most eligible, and whose Friendship is most preferable.

You are, when you are united, like a Strong Rope made of many Small threads, which when twisted together, resist the greatest Force but by Separating the Threads it is easily broken. The method your Enemies make use of to break you is this, They know it is In vain to assail you when twisted together, they therefore endeavour to divide you, and then break Some of the threads, by Leading Your Youth on Expeditions that they know will prove fatal to them, whereby the Rope will be so weakned by Degrees, that it will, at Length, Yeild to a Small Force. 'Tis high time, therefore to apply Your Selves heartily to make Your Youth Sensible of the Snake in the Grass, that they may avoid their Secret Enemy, and to inspire them with true Notions of Liberty, Virtue, and Honour. Are they Lovers of Liberty? Let them not Endeavour to deprive others of theirs; but teach them this Golden Rule of doing to others, only what they would that others Should do them. Is Virtue amiable in Your Eyes? Teach them how Detestable the Vices are of butchering their fellow Creatures, and Laying Waste whole Countries who have given them no Provocation. Is Cowardise a Vice they Hold in Contempt or a Coward a Wretch they dispise? Tell them it is base and Cowardly to kill helpless and defenceless Women and Children, and that the Scalps which they bring Home of such instead of being Trophies of their Valour will be monuments of their Barbarity, Cruelty, and Cowardice. Do they delight in the use of arms? The Savage Beasts will find them Employ, try their Courage, and inure them to Dangers. Have they filial Piety and Brotherly affection? let them reserve themselves to defend their Kindred and every thing that is dear to them from the attempts of their Enemies, if at any time they should be invaded. That will be a War, wherein you may reasonably hope for Success on your arms. For my part it is my Kind concern for you, that makes me speak thus to you; I have your peace and Happiness very much at Heart, and very Zealously wish you Prosperity. I would have all the Several Nations of Indians under the King's Protection how near or how distant so ever they live to or From us united in one comon Covenant Chain of Friendship and alliance; Such an Union would secure you From all the open attempts or Secret Snares of Your Enemies, be they who they will, and if there be any other Nations who have not yet put Themselves under his

Majesty's Protection, that you are willing to cultivate a good Understanding with, and who may be worthy of your alliance invite them to it, make them your fast Friends by that and all other arts of Friendship and Humanity that your United Body may still be stronger, and your Enemies have more Cause to dread you, if they should unjustly attempt any thing against you: Of whose Secret Practises too you ought always to be watchfull; You have been Long acquainted with their arts; what is the End think you they propose to themselves in attempting to Seduce you. Is it Trade? No, they have a more beneficial one with other Nations, nor have they goods always to supply you or them with: I will tell you what it is; You Lye too near them, you are able to annoy them when they give you just Provocation or to restrain them from their Wonted Cruelty to Nations Lying beyond you or in alliance with you; and now knowing their Views, you ought carefully to guard against their arts and Intrigues, and trusting to your own Virtue and Extensive alliance and the great King your Fathers Protection, you may live in peace, and enjoy the Fruits of your Labour with the Utmost Satisfaction and Security. If you neglect my advice, you will Sooner or Later have Cause to repent it; think Seriously of it and let your memory witness for me, that I gave you timely warning of your Fate. But I hope better things From you, and in that Hope I now renew brighten and Strengthen the Covenant Chain, assuring you that we will all on our part be carefull to keep it From Rust, and preserve it inviolable to the End of the World, and I Expect the same From you.

I am informed that some of the Onondage Sachims went to Canada to Speak with the Governor of that place after you had been all acquainted with my Resolution to meet you here this Summer, and not Long before the Interpreter went to Sumon You hither, which I cannot but resent but after what I have already said, I hope none of you will be any more misled by a People whom you have too much Cause to Suspect of Secret Designs against you.

I am very glad that the design which Some of you had to stop the Road to Owsego [*i. e.* Oswego] is laid aside, and the wiser Resolution taken of keeping it open. Your own Interest is highly concerned in having a Place of Trade in the Middle of your Nations, and I am perswaded that you feel the good Effects of it more and more. Suffer not therefore any more Interruption to be given to the Traders, but Encourage them to Frequent that Market by all the Good offices and assistance you can give them. You are sensible that I take all possible care, that you shall be well used in your Dealings nor is that all the benefit you receive. By having a Smith reside in the remotest of your Nations enables you to make your Hunting turn to a better account, than otherwise it would, for your Guns are now kept in good repair without the loss of time in travelling far From Home to have them mended when the[y] want it.

Gave a String of Wampum.

Brethren.

I highly commend your Wisdom in not Suffereing the French to get footing at Tierondequat; you are too well acquainted with them not to know that if by your Permission, they had built but a Small Fishing Hut there, they would soon without your Leave, have built a Fort, and then what had become of your Liberty? You must have held that, and your Country too, at their Pleasure, have been Compelled to Sell your Beaver and to take their goods at whatever price they would set upon them, whereby you would, in a Short time, be reduced to a most deplorable Condition. And if you do not Speedily fall upon some measures to prevent it, they may by Treachery gain their Ends, and Fix themselves there before you are aware of it.

Gave a Belt

Brethren

Upon Complaint made to the great King your Father by the Governor of Virginia that some of your young Men had murdered some of his Majesty's Subjects in that Province, I received his Majesty's Commands to conclude a General Peace Between you and all the Nations of Indians under his Majestyes Protection, of which I directed the Commissioners of Indian affairs to acquaint you, which they Did, and you expressed your Inclination to come into it; and that

you might be the better prepared to do it now, I sent you notice, That that was partly the Business of this Interview. All the Nations under the Kings Protection who live to the Westward and Southward of you, even as far as the Spaniards, would have sent their Deputies hither at this time, were it not, that we are now actually engaged in a War with Spain, however they have desired me to negotiate the Peace on their parts, assuring me they will ratifye it fully and absolutely, and I do solemnly engage for their Performance of it.

The Great King your Father looks upon you, and every Nation of Indians under his Protection as his Children, and it is his desire, That you should all live in the Strictest Friendship and Brotherly Affection with each other, and that you may be inseparably united. It is his Pleasure that all the Nations lying to the Westward and Southward of you, even as far as the River Mississipi be admittted into the Covenant Chain, so that From henceforth all animosities and all Causes of Dislike, Complaint, and Enmity may cease and be buried in eternal oblivion, and, being as one Family, you will be careful of each others Safety, not countenancing or concealing any attempts that you shall know to be Formed against any of you by any of your or our Enemies. but that you give imediate Notice thereof to the Nation against whom Such a Design is formed. This I Faithfully promise on the part of all the Nations of Indians to the Southward and Westward of you, Shall be performed by them to you, and I expect you make the like Solemn Promise to me on your Part.

Gave a Belt of Wampum

The Peace, about which I now treat with you, is not entered upon by me or the Nations I have mentioned of our own Head. It is what the great King your Father has Commanded and recomended to you all, and Surely his Commands, that carry with them, as this does, a General and paternal care and concern for the Peace and Happiness of all his Children and Subjects, cannot but be obeyed with Chearfulness, and observed with Constancy. His Majesty therefore expects it, and I do admit all the Nations of Indians under his Majesty's Protection Lying to the Southward and Westward of us, Even as far as the great River Mississipi into the Covenant Chain with us, as fully and absolutely to all Intents and purposes, as if they had been originally and Constantly comprehended in it, So that henceforward they are to be considered as our Brethren in all respects, as amply as if they had been born and bred in your own Castles and Houses, and descended from,

your ancestors. To Confirm what I have said I give this Belt of Wampum which I desire may be kept by you for ever.

Answer made by the Six Nations of Indians to his Honour George Clarke Esq<sup>r</sup> Lieutenant Governor &c. in Albany the 17<sup>th</sup> Day of August 1740.

Present the Honourable George Clarke Esq<sup>r</sup> &c.  
Philip Livingston, Philip Cortlandt, Daniel Horsmanden Esq<sup>r</sup>. of the Council, the Commissioners for managing the Indian affairs.

Brother Corlaer<sup>23</sup>

You spoke to us the other Day, and we have very well understood the Purport of what you said, we do not intend to repeat it Word for Word, but only answer the Principal Heads.

You told us the reason you did not come up before was, that the Small Pox were at New York, that you was fearfull that Distemper would Spread, that therefore it was out of Tenderness to us that you did not come.

You said also that you was Glad to see us here, we are also Glad of the opportunity to see our Brother here.

Brother Corlaer

You also said that the Reason of your Coming was to renew that antient Covenant Silver Chain, which has so long United our Fore Fathers, and to brighten and Strengthen the Same; and that the Covenant Chain was so Strong and bright that no Enmey [*sic*] can break the same while the World Endures.

Brother Corlaer

We the Six Nations do also as well as you Renew that antient Covenant Chain which has so long Subcisted Between our Forefathers, and make the Same bright, clear, and Strong, and promise on our part that it shall endure to the End of the World. No one that has Entered into Covenant with us has ever had reason to complain of us that we have been Covenant Breakers.

Gave a Belt of Wampum.

Brother Corlaer

You also Said that you had acquainted the Commissioners and they us that you intended Shortly to meet us here, and that we Should stay at Home and not go to Canada: We confess it was told us. You Said Likewise that you very much resented that some of the Onondago Sachims are gone to Canada, but we hope you will Excuse them, they are not gone there to do us hurt, but for the advantage of us all.

Gave a String of Wampum

Brother Corlaer

You also thanked us for our wise Management in Keeping open and Clearing up the Road to Oswego, and told us that the trading House there stands in the midst of our Nations. That it is a vast advantage to the Six Nations, because we can get there what we want or desire. But we think Brother, that your People who trade there, have the most advantage by it, and that it is as good for them as a Silver Mine.

Brother

You Said, That if at any time we Should see any of your People going to Oswego, that we Should assist them, we thank you for your Request, we like it very well; at the carrying Place they are generally in want of assistance, and we promise that we will help them there in carrying their Smaller things, but the Large Casks and Bails they may have rid over.

Brother

We desire that Powder and Lead may be Sold cheaper at Oswego than it is at present, which will be a means to draw the far Nations thither, and we hope that none of the Traders at Oswego may give any Reason or be the occasion of any Quarrel or Disturbance Between us.

We desire also that B. Corlaer will take care that we may be better paid for Building Houses at Oswego.

Gave a String of Wampum.

His Honour answered them.

Brethren

It Seems you do not rightly apprehend what I mean or intend when I recommend to you to assist your Brethren the Traders, when

they are going to Oswego to Trade. It is not that you Should carry any of their Smaller things on the Carrying Place, unless they do desire it From you, for that would be a means to discourage that Trade; wherefore you ought to Leave them at their Liberty and not Stop the Road nor interrupt that Trade which is certainly a great advantage to you as well as the far Nations.

As to what you desire to have Powder and Lead Sold Cheaper at Oswego than it is at present; The Market varies according as goods are in Demand in Europe. You have found by Experience that the more Skins are brought to Oswego and here, the cheaper you have goods. Every Man in Trade makes the best Bargain for himself he can, So that I can give no Directions how the Traders Shall sell their Goods, but only to recomend to them to Use you well, to Encourage the Trade in general, and to give no occasion of any Quarrel or Disturbance Between You.

Then the Indians Proceeded

Brother

You also said that we had acted very wisely in not Suffering the French to Settle at Tierondequat, and that if they had only Liberty to build a Fishing Hut there, they would soon build a Strong Fort. We perceive that both you and the French Intend to Settle that place, but we are fully resolved that neither you nor they Shall Settle there. There is a Jealousy Between you and the Governor of Canada about that Place, if either the one or the other Should Settle there we think it would breed mischeif, Such near neighbours Seldom can agree; We think the trading House at Oswego and that at Niagara are near enough to Each other, for trading Houses too near generally Quarrel about the Trade.

Gave a Belt.

Brother

You also told us that you compared us to a Rope, which being twisted together is Difficult to be broken, but when untwisted and divided into threads then it is easily broken. We think not that we divide this Rope of which you speak, but on the Contrary, Strengthen the Same by making Friendship and alliance with many Nations, which has always been Commanded us by all the Governors of New York. all the Indians which were Formerly our Enemies are now Entered into the Covenant with us, almost as far as the River Mississipi.

Brother

You also Said that you speak in the Name of the King of Great Britain our Father, That it is his will that all the Nations of Indians under his Protection Should be as one Body. as our Father the Great King has comanded us that we Should be as one Flesh and Blood with the Indians to the Southward and Westward as far as Mississipi, So we accept of them as Brethren, that we may be United as one Body one Heart and one Flesh according to the King's Commandment: but then we desire that some of the Sachims of those Southern Indians do come here, which will much Strengthen and confirm this Treaty; we will give them two Years time to come, and in the meantime keep at Home all our fighting men.

In Former times we were but Five Nations, but now so many are Entered into the Covenant Chain with us, both to the Westward and Northward, that they are almost innumerable, whom we must all acquaint with this Treaty to keep them at Home from going to Fight against the Southern Indians, who are the only Nations that are not Entered into Covenant with us.

Brother

The last Belt you gave us, to link us and the Southern Indians together we accept of, and it Shall be kept at Onondage; we promise that when those Southern Indians come here we will give them a Belt to answer this.

His Honours Answered them.

Brethren

If you were in earnest about the Peace of which we now Treat you would not insist upon those Nations Sending a Number of their Sachims here, no more than you did those to the Westward and Northward, and those Treaties were made with the Special Command of the King your Father. But in this Case the King himself interposes, and it is his will, as a Common Father that you Should live as Brethren together. It is impossible that all the Nations to the Southward Should meet you here or any where but they have made choise of me, and I Stand in their Stead; and as I told you before I do engage myself, that they Shall perform, what I have promised on their behalf.

Before I deliver you the Presents which I told Some of you I had From the Governor of Virginia for you in case you Firmly and Solemnly accepted all the Nations of Indians living to the Southward

and Westward as far as the River Mississippi; who are under his Majesty's obedience and Subjection, into the Covenant Chain, I expect that you will receive them and conclude a Peace with me on their behalf and return me a token to Send to the Governor of Virginia as an everlasting Testimony that you have concluded Such a Peace with them.

The answer of the six Nations to what his Honour said Now.

Brother

You just now told us That you was fully impowered by the Indians to the Southward and Westward as far as Mississippi, and that you can transact this affair as fully as if they were present; and that you engage for their performance of this Treaty. On which Consideration we do agree to the Terms required by you, and receive all the Indians aforesaid into the Covenant Chain with us, and shall ever look upon them as our Brethren; and as our own Flesh as if they had actually been born and bred amongst us. And as we have never yet been guilty of violating Treaties, So You may depend that we will keep this inviolable to the End of the World. In Testimony whereof we give you this Belt to be Sent to the Governor of Virginia as an Everlasting token of this Peace.

The account of Contingent Charges From the 25<sup>th</sup> of April 1740 to the Twenty fifth of October Following; and also an account of Work and repairs done about the Governors House were Severally Examined and allowed.

Edward Cary is appointed an Inspector of Tobacco at the Warehouse at Gloucester Town.<sup>24</sup>

The Council took under their Consideration the Case of the Criminals convicted this Court; which was, that one of Grand Jury, by whom the Several Bills of Indictment against them were found was not a Freeholder; which being discovered The Prisoners were, by Council assigned them by the Court for that purpose, made acquainted with it; and after having Conferred with their Counsel, and being given to understand that the Court were Sencible of the advantage they might take of this accident, they were brought to the Bar and waved taking any Exception to the Proceedings, but put themselves upon the mercy of the Court whereupon It is the

opinion and advice of the Board that his Majesty's most gracious Pardon be Granted them.

John Tyler is appointed an Inspector of Tobacco at Bowlers Warehouse in the Room of John Vass.

Upon Consideration of the Petition of John Smith, Zachary Lewis, William Waller, Robert Green, and Benjamin Waller, Leave is granted them to Enter For and Survey one Hundred thousand acres of Land in that part of Orange County which will be in the County of Augusta when that County Shall take place on the River and Branches of Roanoke and the Branches of James River.

The Several Petitions of John Palmer, Sterling Clack, and Bedford Davenport were read and referred to M<sup>r</sup> Attorney General or Richard Francis Esq<sup>r</sup> to Examine the Petitioners Qualifications.

The account of his Majestyes Revenue of two Shillings per Hogshead Port Duties and Head Money ending the Twenty-Fifth of October Last was presented by the Receiver General who made oath thereto and the Same being Examined by the Deputy Auditor was Certified by the President in the Usual Form.

Whereas William Byrd Esq<sup>r</sup> the 11<sup>th</sup> Day of June 1735 obtained an order of this Board to Survey 100000 acres of Land on both Sides the South Branch of Roanoke River Between Birches Creek and the Irvin in one or more distinct Tracts; Settling thereon one Family for each 1000 acres within two Years from the Last of October then next; for the doing Whereof further time has been allowed by Several Subsequent orders. The said William Byrd now acquainting the Board that he can no longer depend upon the Importation of Families to Settle on the Said Land, and moving for Leave to Survey and patent the Same, according to the said Order of the 11<sup>th</sup> Day of June 1735. paying Rights Leave is granted him accordingly.

Upon a Representation From the County Court of Brunswick Ordered that a New Commission of the Peace Issue for that County with the addition of the Following Persons Vizt. Michael Wall, Nicholas Edmunds, Drury Stith, George Hix, and William Hayward recommended by the said Court.

His Majestys Warrant under his Sign Manual bearing Date at St. James's the 16<sup>th</sup> Day of January 1739-40 Countersigned by His Grace the Duke of Newcastle His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, and Directed to the Lieutenant Governor, and in his absence to the Commander in Cheif or the President of the Council for the time being, to authorize the Granting Letters Patent under the Great Seal of this Colony, For appointing Head Lynch Esq<sup>r</sup> Clerk of the Naval or Navy Office of York River in the Room of William Robertson Esq<sup>r</sup> Deceased, was communicated to the Board by M<sup>r</sup> President, and he desiring the advice of the Council thereupon: after Long Debate, the Majority of the Board were of opinion, That as William Gooch the Younger Esq<sup>r</sup>, Soon after M<sup>r</sup> Robertson's Death, was appointed by the Lieutenant Governor, (with the advice of the Council) Naval Officer of York River pursuant to an act of Parliament made in the Fifteen Year of the Reign of King Charles the Second; and has given Security to the Comissioners of his Majesty's Customs, to his Majesty's Use, and been by them approved of, Pursuant to another act made in 7<sup>th</sup> 8<sup>th</sup> Years of the Reign of King William the third; and he having been also in like manner appointed Collector of the Virginia Duties, pursuant to Several Acts of Assembly of this Colony and the constant Usage in the like Cases (of all which they Conceive his Majesty had not been informed) That an Humble Representation of the Case be made to his Majesty and that the granting the Said Letters Patent to the Said Head Lynch be respited until his Majesty Shall be pleased to Signifie his Pleasure concerning the Premisses, and it is ordered by consent of the Parties that in the mean time the Profits of the said Office be Sequestered.

Upon reading a Letter From his Grace the Duke of Newcastle Dated at Whitehall Aprill the 18<sup>th</sup> 1740. Ordered that so many Copies of the Act of Parliament and Proclamation therein mentioned and Inclosed as Shall be necessary be forthwith printed and

sent to the Several Sherifs of this Colony; that they be directed to publish them on the Court Day of their respective Counties which Shall happen next after they Shall receive the Same and that after Publication thereof they deliver the Said Act of Parliament and Proclamation to the Clerks of their respective County Courts; and every Such Clerk is to affix the Proclamation in Some Public Place in his office, and to keep by him the act of Parliament to the End that all Persons may, for their Further Information have recourse thereto.

The Council proceeded to the Consideration of the Subject matter of the Representation to be made to his Majesty in relation to the Sign Manual for appointing Head Lynch Esq<sup>r</sup> Clerk of the Naval or Navy office of York River; and, it being a matter of Great Importance, referred the Further Consideration thereof to a fuller Council.

The Council being informed that Several Masters of Ships were attending and Desired admittance, they were called in; and informed the Board, that by reason of the Severity of the Weather they had been prevented from Bringing more than a very inconsiderable part of their Loading on Board their Ships, and that Should Captain Lloyd with his Majesty's Ships the Winchester and South Sea Castle, under his Command leave the Country before they can Compleat their Loading which they beleive they cannot do before the Last of April, they Shall be obliged to return Home without Convoy, which will be Contrary to their Orders and Expose them to great Danger, They therefore made their Humble application to the Council, that they will be pleased to Employ their good Offices to Engage Captain Lloyd to prolong the time of his Departure until they can Compleat their Loading that they may have the advantage of Sailing under his Convoy. And then they withdrew.

Ordered that a Letter to Captain Lloyd, recomending to his Consideration the Difficulties the Ships have been under of getting their



Loading on Board almost Ever Since their arrival, and the ill Consequences that may attend their Sailing without Convoy.

And a Letter to Sir Yelverton Peyton Captain of his Majesty's Ship the Hector, Desiring him to Convoy the Mast Ships From New England hither; which will not only Induce Captain Lloyd to stay for the Ships in the Tobacco Trade, but enable him to Convoy them directly to England be prepared and Laid before the Board to Morrow Morning.

The Board being informed by Captain Lloyd, that Upon their Letter he had determined to defer his Departure From hence till the 20<sup>th</sup> of April, Ordered That an Embargo be Laid on all Ships and Vessels bound for Great Britain until the said Twentyeth Day of April, and that the Naval officers do forthwith notifie the Same to the Masters of Ships in their respective Districts to the End they may prepare in due time to Join Captain Lloyd in Kiquotan Road in James River; and that the said Officers take care that no Ship or Vessel bound for Great Britain be cleared until Bond be Given as the Law directs for observing this Embargo.

Deceased, and he having Yesterday Taken the oaths appointed to be taken by act of Parliament Instead of the oaths of allegiance and Supremacy and having also taken the oath of abjuration and Subscribed the Test in the General Court, was accordingly admitted, and the Oath of his Office administer'd to him.

M<sup>r</sup> Secretary's Petition for an Inclusive Patent for Sundry Contiguous Lands therein mentioned was granted accordingly.<sup>25</sup>

Ordered That Rights Issue to the value of Five Hundred Pounds as Usual.

Edmund Pendleton's Petition for a Licence to Practice as an attorney in the County Courts is granted on Condition of his producing a Certificate From the attorney General of his being Qualified, To whom the Examination thereof is now referred.<sup>26</sup>

John Wayles his Petition for the Same Granted as aforesaid.<sup>27</sup>

His Majesty's Warrant under his Royal Signet and Sign Manual in favour of Head Lynch Esq<sup>r</sup> which Stands referred for a fuller Council to make an Humble Representation of the Case to his Majesty before the granting any Commission to the said Lynch, Till his Majesty's Pleasure be known thereupon, being again Considered, and the Question put. Five of the Members present were for advising the President to grant a Commission to the Said Lynch without delay. The other Four now present were for respiting the Granting the Said Commission as agreed on in the First Council upon it.

But this being an Extraordinary Case in which it was thought necessary to have the Opinion of Every Member in the Country and Colonel Lightfoot who had given his opinion in the First Council for the respiting as above being Detained From attending by the

Gout, it was thought adviseable to Send a Messenger to him (with an account of what had now passed thereon) To desire his present opinion upon it; Which being received in the Following Words Vizt. York April 23<sup>d</sup> 1741. Sir. M<sup>r</sup> Blair informs me that the affair of the Sign Manual in favour of M<sup>r</sup> Lynch had been this day under Consideration of the Council who are desirous of my opinion upon the Question. I observe how differe[n]tly our Minds Seem to be affected in regard to the Consequence. Yet as I can't Conceive our humble Representation before the admission of M<sup>r</sup> Lynch can possibly give his Majesty any offence; and as the matter is circumstanced be any Injury to him to wait his Majesty's Determination; therefore must adhere to my Former Opinion for respiting the Commission to M<sup>r</sup> Lynch until the matter is represented and his Majesty's Pleasure known thereupon, and this be pleased to Communicate to the Council. It is therefore Considered that the Council are Equally Divided upon it; and that for want of a Majority the Intended representation previous to the granting any Commission cannot be made.

The President Representing that the General Assembly which the Governor had Prorogued to the Last Thursday in December Last, had by him, (by his Proclamation of the Twentyeth of that Month) been Further Prorogued to the Seventeenth Instant with a View to have that matter Further considered in the Council then Intended the Twenty Fourth of February of which he desired the then Clerk of the Council to put them in Mind; But it Happening then to be forgot, and the said Clerk dying Suddainly on the Twelfth Instant, without ever having Published the Last Proroguation, the Day Slipt over before it was observed. Whereupon the President desiring the opinion of this Board, The Consideration thereof is Referred to a Council to be held near the End of the Court to advise what can be done therein.

Setting Forth the great Misfortune had befallen them in the said Ships being Cast on Shoar by the Violence of the Ice, before She had taken in her Loading, and praying Remission of the Tonnage of the said Ship, which the Naval officer of the District insisted on, It is ordered That the Said Tonnage be accordingly remitted, and that the Naval Officer do not insist on the Payment thereof.

On the Petition of the Nottoway's It is ordered that Henry Morris be sent to the Cherokees to Demand the two Nottoways by them carried away Last Fall From Roanoke, and also to Demand Justice on the Murtherers for the Murther of the three Nottoway's by them kill'd at the Same time and Place.

Ordered that it be an Instruction to the said Henry Morris to make Enquiry among the Catawbias after two Delaware Indians the Sons of Captain Hill, by them taken Prisoners at Hohio about Six Years ago, as the Governor of Pensylvania by his Letter to the President, now read, does Sett forth and desire.

James Willeroy being recommended by the Court is appointed an Inspector of Tobacco at Williams's Warehouse in King William County during the Incapacity of James Macon Gent.

Ordered that a New Commission of the Peace Issue for the County of Goochland with the addition of Sundry New Members Recommended by the Court.<sup>28</sup>

Ordered That a New Commission of the Peace Issue for the County of Northumberland with the addition of Cuthbert Spann, John Foushee and George Ball Junr. Gentlemen they being recommended by the Court For Justices.

Ordered That a New Commission of the Peace do Issue for the County of Prince William, and that William Fairfax Esq<sup>r</sup> be First in that Commission; and that an Error in a Name in the Former Commission be now amended by incerting Daniel Tebbs, instead of Tilby.

Present M<sup>r</sup> Secretary

On Consideration of the Petition of M<sup>r</sup> John Coles Merchant Setting Forth that he had purchased a Large Quantity of Wheat to the Value of £1500 Sterling with intent to Ship the Same on Board the Joanna and the Murdock to Great Britain; That the Joanna was Lost in the Bristol Channel Coming out, and the Murdock by the Ice here in James River rendered unfit to proceed on her Intended Voyage: That he cannot on any Terms procure Freight for the Same to Britain, But that he has the offer of a Vessel to Lisbon, and that Unless he be permitted to Send the Same thither he is in danger of Utterly Loseing the said Wheat as it is a Decaying Commodity and will Soon become of no Value. That he is informed this Honourable Board have Laid or intend to Lay an Embargo on all Ships carrying Provisions out of this Colony until Security be given that the Same Shall be carried to Great Britain or some of the British Plantations in America. That he Humbly Conceives the Design and Intent of Such an Embargo must be to prevent the Spanish Fleets and Settlements in the West Indies From being Supplied with Provisions during the Present War; and that the Carrying of Wheat to Lisbon can not be any prejudice to his Majesty's Service, But that the Petitioner must be a great Sufferer unless permitted to Send it thither; and praying that his Case may be Excepted, and that he may be permitted to Send the Said Wheat to Lisbon he being ready to give Security for the Landing it there or in Some part of Great Britain.

A Debate arose hereupon

And the Question being put, it was carried, that in the Present Circumstances all proper precaution was necessary to Prevent Supplies Coming to the Enemies and that the Private Interest of the Inhabitants here must give way to the Public Good, and that there was reason From Private advises to believe there is now an act of

Parliament disallowing Such Exportation, and therefore that the Petition cannot be granted.

Ordered that it be rejected.

A Letter From Admiral Vernon being now read at the Board advising the arrival of three Large Squadrons of French and Spanish Men of War in the West Indies, who he thinks, rely on being Supplied with Provisions From these parts, either immediately From the French Ports before we may come to a Rupture with them, or From Statia and Curascoa afterwards; and the Admiral recommending it as most material for his Majesty's Service, that no one be permitted at this Critical Juncture to Clear out without giving Sufficient Security not to Land his Provisions at any French or Dutch Settlements or any other but his Majesty's Colonies; where all they can raise will probly be wanted for the Subsistance of his Majestyes Troops, on receipt of which the President had Immediately Issued his Commands to the Several Naval Officers to act Conformably till a Council could be had, and they Should receive his Further orders thereupon.

On Consideration whereof it is now ordered that no Naval Officer in this Colony do clear, and they are hereby in his Majesties Name charged and required not to clear any Ship or Vessel trading in Provisions without First taking Bond and Sufficient Security (Having regard to the Value of the Cargo) not to Land the Same at any French or Dutch Settlements, or any other but his Majesties Colonies, and to return proper Certificates For the port, in the Usual time allowed, of their having So Landed them.

Ordered That a New Commission of the Peace Issue for the County of Hanover, and that Several New Members Recommended by the Court be added thereto.

The account of Contingent Charges, as also the account of Work done at the Governors House, were now Settled and allowed.

A Recommendation from the Court of Orange for the Remission of Some Fines by them imposed is Rejected, no Reason being by them assigned for Such Remission.

The Petition of Penelope Floyd for the Remission of a Fine Laid by the Court of Charles City is rejected.

The Consideration of the Petition of the Vestry of Saint Marks in Orange County praying the Direction of the Council with regard to the Poor of the new Intended Parish of St. Thomas, already

Seperated From St. Mark's but not Yet erected into a Parish of themselves, is postponed till after the Oyer and Terminer Court.

as also the Petition of the Inhabitants of the New Intended Parish of St. Thomas praying to be Ereceted [*sic*] into a Distinct County From Orange by the Name of the County of Frederick as by Law directed they conceiving themselves to have now a Sufficent Number of Inhabitants for that Purpose, who are greatly distressed by reason of their distance From Orange Court is postponed to the Same time.

The Petition of Alexander Ross, and John Littler praying an order for 1000. acres in the Intended County of Frederick to Entitle them to the preemption thereof when the Land Office there is open'd) If it Shall be Found to be Kings Land and not within the Grant to my Lord Fairfax, and alledging Several Reasons for the Said order; the Consideration thereof is likewise Postponed to the Same time.

The President Communicated to this Board a Letter From Governor Clarke acknowledging the receipt of a Bill of Exchange for £100. Sterling Drawn by John Grymes Esq<sup>r</sup> in favour of Philip Livingston Esq<sup>r</sup> for his account of Presents to the Indians.

Also a Letter From Governor Ogle acknowledging the favour of the Presidents Notice to him of our Embargo and of the Stay Cap<sup>t</sup> Lloyd had agreed to make.

Also a Letter From Sir Yelverton Peyton with his Handsom Excuse for not going to Piscataway to Convoy hither the two mastships as desired by this Board the 25<sup>th</sup> of February Last.

Also a Letter From President Bull giving an account of the Dreadfull fire which happened Lately at Charles Town.

Also a Letter From Peter Leheup Esq<sup>r</sup> giving his reasons for not presenting the addresses for the Liberty of a Free Importation of Salt hither, at Present, and another praying a Consideration of his Services in relation to the Northern Neck affair; which is made up to him in full of the Governors Promise, In the Present account of Contingent Charges.

On reading a Letter From S<sup>r</sup> Yelverton Peyton Baronet Commander of his Majesties Ship the Hector of the third Instant Lamenting the Depredations Lately Committed and the Impending Danger to our Trade at this Critical Juncture (The Hector being then Unfitt to go to Sea till he had repaired the Damage by thunder She had Lately Sustained) and advising as absolutely necessary that a Sloop be fitted out to Cruse on the Coast, and offering to Supply her with Forty able Hands and a Proper officer if Such Vessel can be got ready in two or three Day's, and Provided She may return in ten or Twelve Day's at Farthest, at which time he Should want them himself to go to Sea.

It is the opinion of this Board that the President Write a Letter to S<sup>r</sup> Yelverton to Excuse the taking any Men from his Majestyes Ship which might have ill Consequences in other respects, and would Straiten the Design in Point of time.

The Council being informed that Robert Dinwiddie Esq<sup>r</sup> Surveyor General of the Customs in the Southern District of America attended below to be Sworn of the Council here, Sent their Clerk to him to desire him to Come in and produce his Letter and be Sworn accordingly. and the Said Dinwiddie Comming in Produced only his Commission to be Surveyor General aforesaid, and being askt if he had a Letter directing his being admitted of the Council he answered he had given the Governor a Letter when he First produced his Commission to him, and was Sworn thereto, not in Council but before the Governor. But that by an Instruction to the Governor he was by Virtue of his office to be admitted of the Council. This Board being Unacquainted with the Said Letter and desiring to See the Said Instruction took time to Consider thereof, and the Said Dinwiddie withdrew.

Then the Council directed their Clerk to wait upon M<sup>r</sup> Gooch and desire that he would Search among his Fathers Papers for the Said Letter and for the Instruction and to have them ready against to Morrow.

The President Laid before the Board a Letter he had Received the Twenty first Ult. From Governor Johnston which was read Dated the Fourth Day of May Last. Inclosing an affidavit of Captain Miles Gale of Edenton Mariner giving an account of the taking of Two Sloops a Little without the Bar of Ocacock the Twenty Seventh of April last, by two Spanish Privateer Sloops which are daily to be Seen off the Bar. The Governor informing that all their Vessels that go out over that Bar are Loaded with Provisions and Naval Stores, and hoping that, as they have no Ship of his Majesty's to defend them, nor any Vessel of Force in the Province, the necessary orders will be given from hence to the Captains of the Men of War on this Station.

The President Communicated likewise a Letter which he received the Seventh Instant From the Governor of Pensylvania which was read Dated the Twenty Second of May Last inclosing the Depositions of Four Mariners Late of the Ship Brunsdel of Whitehaven John Simpson Master taken the Ninth of May Last by a Spanish Privateer about Six Leages from Cape Charles Mann'd with 130. Men, who had with them a Prize Sloop taken the Day before, that on the Eleventh She took the America of Glasgow Robert Ritchie, and a Sloop From Virginia Laden with Pork and Corn Johnson Master. and on the thirteenth She took a Sloop From North Carolina with Pitch and Tar which She gave to the Prisoners among whom the Deponents who learnt that three more Privateers came out with him to Cruse on this Coast. The Governor represents the Danger the Provisions for the fleet and army in the West Indies Contracted for in that place will be in of falling into the Enemies Hands Unless the Ships upon this Station Shall Extend their Cruse to the Capes of Delaware, as Captain Warren is with Admiral Vernon, and Captain Peirce under Orders to Convoay Some Mast Ships to England.

Aron Quarles is appointed Inspector at Quarls's Warehouse in King William in the room of Richard Gregory who resigns.

The Council being informed by their Clerk that he had according to their order waited upon M<sup>r</sup> Gooch and acquainted him with their Honours desire to See the Letter Mentioned by M<sup>r</sup> Dinwiddie as by him given to the Governor when he produced his Commission to him to be Surveyor General, and also the Instruction relating to the admitting Such officers of the Council; But that upon a Diligent Search neither the Said Letter nor Instruction could be found. It is the opinion of this Board, That if M<sup>r</sup> Dinwiddie can produce any Letter or Instruction for admitting him of the Council, The President may Swear him in; but as neither his Letter nor the Instruction can as Yet be found, they cannot advise it at this time.

On Considering at this Board the Letters from the Governors of Pennsylvania and North Carolina with the accounts of Sundry Ships and Vessels Lately taken by Spanish Privateers on this Coast; and a Petition of Sundry Merchants now attending and Inhabitants of the Borough of Norfolk, Hampton, and adjacent Places Setting Forth that their Trade and Navigation is very much retarded and in Danger of being intirely Stopped by the Depredations and Daily Captures Made by the Spanish Privateers all along the Coast, and Some of them in or near the Mouth of our Bay, and Considering the Sad Consequences of having So many Ships and Vessels fall into the Hands of the Enemy Several of them being Loaden with Provisions and Naval Stores. and for preventing as much as in us lies any future Depredations From them and to Secure the Maritime parts of this Colony From their Insults. It is the opinion of this Board and accordingly ordered that Two Sloops be taken up or impressed For his Majesty's Service, and the Defence of this Colony and the Trade thereof as Private Sloops of War to annoy the Enemy as occasion Shall offer; and that they be kept in the Said Service for three Months and no Longer.

That Alexander M<sup>e</sup>Kenzie [*sic*], John Hutchings, and Robert Tucker Gentlemen be appointed Commissioners for the fitting out the said Vessels and Conducting the affair according to the Instructions they Shall from Time to time receive from the President.

That the said Commissioners have Power to Impress the said Sloops, and have them Valued by Such Persons as they Shall appoint.

That the Commissioners have Said Sloops compleatly Fitted out for the Purpose of Cruising in a Warlike manner on the Coast.

That they be furnished with Powder, Bullets and Small arms out of the Magazine; and that they be impowered to Borrow or Hire Great Guns or any other necessarys (as they see occasion) to be valued by Such Persons as they Shall appoint and to have Iron Shott made, if not to be had more readily.

That the said Sloops be manned with not Less than Sixty Men Each, nor more than Seventy including officers.

That a Proclamation Issue to invite Sailors into the Service on the Encouragement in the Late act of Parliament and his Majesties Proclamation issued thereupon, and on the further Encouragement of Forty Shillings per Month pay From the time of their Enlisting.

That the Commissioners be impowered if need be, to impress Men by themselves or those Commissioned by them.

That the Commissioners do recomme[n]d Proper officers To the President, who is desired to give Commissions as to Private Ships of War according to the Late act of Parliament and his Majesties Proclamation thereupon.

That one of the Captains be Commodore and have the Direction of the other when at Sea.

That the Commissioners be impowered to give orders and Directions to the Captains of the said Sloops; and that the said Captains do observe all Such orders and Instructions as they Shall from time to time receive From them.

That the Hire of the said Sloops be not Exceeding Fourteen Shillings Current Money per Tonn per Month. That all Damage they Shall Sustain be made good to the Owners; and that if the said Sloops or either of them be Lost in the Service the owner Shall be paid according to the Valuation before Directed.

That the Commissioners Victual the Sailors in like manner as on Board Merchant Ships or otherwise if Necessary.

That the whole Expense of this affair be paid by John Grymes Esq<sup>r</sup> his Majesties Receiver General out of his Majesties Revenue of Two Shillings per Hogshead.

That the armourer gett 150. Muskets, 150 pair of Pistolls, and 150. Broad Swords in readiness in a Week, and all the rest with Dispatch afterwards.

That in all Difficulties the Commissioners apply to the President and take his Directions.

That in Case any Prize be taken they be Condemned and Shared according to the Late act of Parliament for the more Effectuall Securing

and Encouraging the Trade of his Majesties British Subjects to America, and for the Encouragement of Seamen to Enter into his Majesties Service; and according To the Directions in his Majesties Proclamation issued thereupon for dividing the same among the officers and Sailors of any of his Majesties Ships of War.

That the Commissioners give Public Notice of the times of the Sailing of the said Sloops, that the Ships then ready may have the benefitt of their Convoy off the Coast.

Ordered that the Receiver General do Send for fifty Barrels of Gunpowder to Furnish the Magazine.

And that the President in the Name of the Council do make application for his Majesties Favour and Bounty to this Country in Sending us a Supply of arms and ammunition for the Defence of this his Majesties Most antient Colony.

The Petition of M<sup>rs</sup> Alice Needler Widow was read Setting Forth that at the time the Petitioners Late Husband Benjamin Needler Esq<sup>r</sup> was appointed Clerk to this Honoble Board. The Books and Papers relating to the proceedings before this Board were in great disorder and Confusion and the Journals and orders for Several Years not Entered up in the Proper Books. And that her Said Late Husband had made Some progress in Entring up the said orders, and making an alphabetical Index for the more ready finding some others. In Pursuance of a Command he received from this Honourable Board to Draw up and transcribe Such orders and Journals as he found had not been done by his Predecessor and praying that Such allowance may be made her as Shall be thought reasonable.

Ordered that the Consideration hereof be referred to Philip Lightfoot Esq<sup>r</sup> and that the Clerk of the Council do attend him with the Books and Show the Several Services done.<sup>38</sup>

The Petition of John Hutchings Gent. being now read praying that his Contract for Sterling Money for the Hire of Shipping to transport the Forces raised for his Majesties Service last Year to Jamacia [*sic*], which he had fully Performed might be paid him in the Current Money of this Country at the real difference of Twenty Five per Cent. The consideration thereof is referred till the Governor Shall Return.

On the Caveat Entered by Francis Thornton against Benjamin Berryman the Last Summons not being returned, Ordered that a New Summons Issue.

On the Caveats Entered by Richard Ward against John Mullins and Richard Randolph for 496. acres on appomattax after hearing of the Parties, It is ordered that the said Caveats be discharged and that the said John Mullins have a Patent for the Land.

On the Caveat Entered by John Watson against John Towns for about Eight Hundred acres on little Roanoake in Brunswick, ordered that the Said Caveat be discharged and that the Said Towns have a Patent for the Land.

On the Petition of Robert Armstead Gentleman one of the Executors of Judith Butts Widow Deceased Setting Forth that the said Judith in her last Will and Testament had Enjoyed her Executors to apply to this Honourable Board for Leave to Sett Free a Female Slave Named Lilly aged about Nineteen Years, of which the Said Judith died possessed; The Said Judith having had a great regard for her the Said Lilly, on account of Several very acceptable Services done by her for the Said Judith; and praying that She may be Sett Free accordingly. Ordered that Leave be granted to Manumitt and Sett Free the Said Female Slave Named Lilly according to the Will of the Said Judith Butts Deceased and the Prayer of the Petitioner.

Ordered that a New Commission of the Peace do Issue for the County of Henrico, and that Peter Randolph Benjamin Harrison<sup>34</sup> and John Coles Gentlemen be added thereto; and that John Redford James Powel Cocke, Thomas Branch, and Joseph Tanner Gentlemen be Left out of the Said Commission they having refused to act.

Ordered That a New Commission of the Peace do Issue for the County of Amelia, and that William Clement, Samuel Tarry, William Archer, Hezekiah Ford, William Booker Henry Childs, and Wood Jones be added thereto; and that Richard Jones, Henry Anderson, Robert Tucker Thomas Jones, Francis Anderson, and Richard Clarke who have Refused to Qualify, and John Dawson and James Branch who are dead, be left out of the Said Commission.

John Taylor having got a Survey of Four Hundred acres in Brunswick on both Sides of Cubb Creek Surveyed in November Last, Has leave on his Petition now read to add Eight Hundred acres thereto above and below the Said Survey on both Sides the Said Creek, and to have one Patent for the whole.

The Petition of Wilson Cary Gentleman was this day Read Setting Forth that the Petitioner had Lately had Some Reason to apprehend there might be Some Surplus or Kings Land within the known and reputed Bounds of his Land in Gloucester County which may perhaps amount to about Eight Hundred acres or a Little More. and praying an order From this Honourable Board, That he may have Leave to make an Exact Survey of the whole, and to take out a New Patent agreeably thereto, He being Ready to pay Rights for all the Surplusage that Shall be Found more than is Expressed in his Present Patent. and as this Honourable Board granted a Petition of this Nature to Henry Fitzhugh Esq<sup>r</sup> for a much Larger Surplusage found within his Bounds, with a Discharge of all arrears of Quit Rents for the said Surplus in Consideration of his having made the discovery himself, The Petitioner Humbly Hopes that for the Same reason he Shall be Favoured with the Same Indulgence, Especially as he will be at the Charge of a New Survey to discover it. On consideration whereof the Council Looking upon it as a Matter of Right, For which the Said Cary need not have Petitioned. Do order that it be according to the Prayer of the Petitioner.

On the Petition of George Walker Gentleman Leave is Granted him to Enter For and Survey 4500 acres in Amelia, adjoining round 1500. acres of his own Land there on Bush River, to Extend to the Lines of Colonel Richard Randolph and Henry Liggon, and to have an Inclusive Patent for the Whole.

The Petition of Robert Bolling Gentleman Surveyor of the County of Prince George praying Leave to have a Deputy or assistant in his Said office, is referred to the President and Masters of the College.

On consideration of the Petition of M<sup>rs</sup> Alice Needler Widow referred Yesterday to Philip Lightfoot Esq<sup>r</sup> and now by him Laid before this Board with the Books containing the Services for which an

allowance is prayed; It is Ordered that the Sum of Twenty Five Pounds Current Money be paid her by the Receiver General in full of her Claim, and that he place the Same to the account of Contingent Charges.

The Minutes of Yesterday relating to the Fitting out the Two Sloops for the Defence of this Country were read and Corrected.

M<sup>r</sup> Robert Munford who was Sent Last Fall to acquaint the Catauba and Cheraukee Indians with the Peace concluded by the Governor of New York in their behalf with the Six Nations of the Northern Indians at Albany on the Seventeenth of August Last, and to Desire them to Send their Deputies at the time appointed in the Year 1742 To Albany to meet the Sachims of the Said Six Nations, and there to confirm the Peace aforesaid, Did now appear before this Board to give an account of his Negotiation. And the Said Munford Did thereupon represent that he had Communicated the Presidents Letter with the account of the Said Peace to the Heads of the Several Towns and great Men of the Said Cheraukee and Catauba Nations, and had brought a Belt of Wampum From the Cataubas, and a Pipe of Peace from the Cheraukees in Token of their having accepted of the Said Peace Concluded at Albany on their behalf which Said Belt and Pipe he Delivered in at the Table; Together with an Answer or Writing of Excuse Dated at Howassy March the 25<sup>th</sup> 1741. From the Cheraukees Shewing why they Could not Send to Albany till a Reparation for a Mischief Lately done by Some of the Cheraukees to the Northern Indians be First Settled and adjusted; Least while the Said Northern Indians are in that hight of Passion as is reasonable to beleive they must be, The Innocent (Should the Cheraukees Send their Deputies in that time) might Suffer instead of the guilty. and therefore they desire that one or two of the Persons injured may Come to their Nation and Demand a Satisfaction which is no more than Just, and they will readily Comply with it and then in order [for] a future Security and Lasting Confirmation of the Peace aforesaid they will Send Eight or Ten of their Head Men to Albany to meet his Honour the Governor of New York and perform what he has promised on their Parts.<sup>35</sup>

The said Munford likewise reported that while he was among the Cheraukees a Party of the Northern Indians had fallen upon Some of the Cheraukees and killed or taken and Carried away about Sixty of

them; and that the Cheraukes had thereupon Entertained a Suspicion of him as if he had brought those Indians upon them, and while he was amusing them with Peace was only contriving the more Easily to destroy them; and that he was in danger of being killed by them; but that in the mean time an Express From Carolina came thither who brought them The Same account of the Peace concluded at Albany which M<sup>r</sup> Munford had but Just before brought them From hence; which Convinced them of his Innocence. and it is Said that That party of the Northern Indians which has done this Late Mischief to the Cheraukees, is a party that have been out a Long time and had not Notice of the Peace.

The Said Munford likewise reported that having heard while he was out of the Murther Committed Last fall by Some of the Cheraukees upon three of the Nottoway's while they were Hunting together, and that they had also taken and Carried away two more of those Nottoways, He reproved them for it as very ill done, Especially Since there was a Peace Lately made Between them, and they were Hunting Friendly together. To which the Great Men of the Cheraukees Said it was indeed very ill done; but that it was done by some base fellows among them, and offered to make any Satisfaction to the Nottoways they could desire, and to return the Prisoners as Soon as they can Safely do it; and Desired the Nottoways would come and receive the Satisfaction and the Prisoners. But Colonel Symmons who was present in behalf of the Nottoways Said that the Nottoways had more reason to Suspect them since they had not sent back the two prisoners by M<sup>r</sup> Munford, and were affraid to go to them.

Ordered that a Messenger go [to] the Cheraukees to bring Back the Said Prisoners and to demand Justice upon the Murderers.

Ordered that M<sup>r</sup> Munford have Forty Pounds paid him by the Receiver General for his trouble and Charges in this Negotiation; and that no more be paid for Sending for the Prisoners.

Ordered that the Belt of Wampum and Pipe of Peace be Sent to the Governor of New York as Tokens that the Catauba and Cheraukees have accepted of the Peace concluded by him at Albany with the Six Nations on their behalf; and also the Writing of Excuse or answer of the Cheraukees Sent by M<sup>r</sup> Munford.

Robert Rose and Charles Lewis appearing at this Board on a Caveat Entered by the said Rose against a Patents Issuing to the Said Lewis for two thousand acres of Land according to a Plott and Survey now produced, made in Pursuance of an order of this

Honourable Board the 11<sup>th</sup> Day of June 1740. The Said Rose alledging that the Said Lewis had not duely pursued the Said order in making the Said Survey, but had laid it off in a manner very Disadvantagious to the Petitioner. On hearing the Parties by themselves and their attorneys, and considering the allegations on both Sides; The Said Plott and Survey is Confirmed to the Said Lewis as duely made, and a Patent is ordered to Issue accordingly; and the Caveat Entered by the said Rose is Discharged.

On a Caveat Entered by Robert Christian against George Carrington for 1200. acres of Land Lying on the North Side of Fluvanna River in Goochland Surveyed on Several Contiguous Entrys for the said Carrington. It appearing that the said Carrington had neglected to Sue out a patent in due time, Ordered that a Patent Issue to the Petitioner.

The Caveat of James Maxwell et Uxor against Richard Bernard is Continued for Depositions to be taken.

The Caveat Entered by Peter Hudson against John Cargill for 350. acres or thereabouts in Brunswick on the South Side of Stanton River, on a hearing of the Parties is Discharged, and a Patent ordered to Issue to the Said Cargill.

The Caveat of Benjamin Rennolds against Benjamin Berryman is continued the Summons of the Twenty Seventh of April Last not being returned.

On hearing of the Caveat of Tully Choice against Granting a Patent to William Johnston for 1000. acres in orange on Black Walnut Run adjoining to the Land of Captain Spencer, the Said William Johnston having Neglected to Sue out a Patent for the Same in due time. It is ordered that a Patent be granted to the said Tully Choice for the Said 1000. acres of Land.

The Caveat of John Watson against Samuel Hosford is Continued; the Summons not being returned, ordered that a New Summons Issue.

The Caveat of Josias Randle and William Hill against Robert Munford is Continued for Munford to Shew an order of Council which it is alledged by his attorney has been obtained in his Favour relating to this Dispute.

The Petition of John Robinson Esq<sup>r</sup> Jun<sup>r</sup> being read praying that a Patent may be ordered him for 5059 acres in Spotsylvania Lapsed From him to Benjamin Needler Gent. Deceased for want of Cultivation and for which the Petitioner did afterwards come to an agreement with the Said Needler, but the said Needler having neglected to make an assignment thereof, the Clerk of the Secretary's office refused to make out a Patent To the Petitioner, tho' on a Supposition that the Patent had been made out as the Said Needler had promised and agreed it Should; the Petitioner had paid the Quit Rents for three Years past Ordered that the Consideration hereof be referred for Proof of the allegations.

The Following Petitions for Land were read and Granted Vizt.

On the Petition of Christopher Degraffenriedt Leave is granted him to Enter For and Survey Four Hundred acres in Brunswick Lying Between a Patent of his of 1845 acres, and a Tract of 404. acres for which he obtained a Decree of the General Court in April Last as Lapsed From Richard Ledbetter, and to have an Inclusive Patent for the whole.

On the Petition of Richard Taliaferro Leave is granted him to take out a Patent for 1263 acres according to Plott and Survey made thereof by Colonel Drury Stith Late Surveyor of Brunswick for Benjamin Simmons Including 922. acres Seperated From the rest by a Pricked Line, and Since Patented in the Name of the Said Simmons and Purchased by the Said Taliaferro together with the said Simmons's Rights to the Remaining 341. acres which is Granted on Condition that the Petitioner pay Rights for the Said 341. acres not Yet Patented.

On the Petition of John Williamson Leave is Granted him to Survey and Patent 1000. acres in Prince George Begining at the Sapponee Road, thence down the Reedy Branch on both Sides for Quantity.

On the Petition of Robert Hook Leave is granted him to Survey and Patent 3000. acres in Augusta, on the South Branch of

Sherrando, above the Line Claimed by Lord Fairfax from the Head of the Southermost Branch of Rappahanock to the Head of the North Branch of Potomack.

On the Petition of Edward Colwell Leave is granted him to take up 2000. acres in Brunswick Begining at the Fork of Couches's Creek and up and down the Said Creek on both Sides for Quantity.

Philip Smith when George Oldham the other Inspector was absent Upon Consideration of the premisses the Board are of Opinion that this Complaint does not come properly before them upon M<sup>r</sup> Conways Memorial but that if the<sup>s</sup>aid Kent has been guilty of a Breach of his Duty he ought to be prosecuted against as in the usual form And that Witnesses should be examined & Depositions taken as usual in the like Cases before the Board can take any Cognizance of this Matter.

Upon Reading a Letter from Col William Beverley to the Honble John Grymes Esq<sup>f</sup> dated December 7<sup>th</sup> 1742 Purporting That Whereas he has a Patent for Point Comfort and the Government having thought fit to build a Fort & other Buildings there without giving him any thing

for his Land He thinks he has an undisputed right to them all; but as he designs to sell the Land & would avoid Law Suits, hopes the Government will be pleased to buy the whole Island of him And as he apprehends he may recover the Fort & Buildings, that they will not Scruple to give him One hundred & twenty pounds Sterling for the whole there being One hundred & twenty acres more or less The Board taking this Matter into Consideration it being a Matter of Law

Ordered

That it be referred to M<sup>r</sup> Attorney General to enquire into the whole State of this Affair And to Report the same with his Opinion thereupon to this Board.

On the Motion of the Officers of his Majesty's Revenue they are impowered to sign Rights to the value of five hundred pounds And the Receiver General is to issue them as usual

The Governor was pleased to lay before the Board a Letter from the Admiralty Office dated 14<sup>th</sup> August 1742 Purporting that the Captains of his Majesty's Ships Stationed in Virginia have made frequent Complaints to the Lords of the Admiralty that their Seamen desert from them in great Numbers being tempted thereto by the high wages given in the Merchants Service to the great prejudice & disservice of the Colony itself whereby his Majestys Ships are so disabled & weakened as not to be in a Condition to defend

their Coasts & Trade from the Insults of the Enemy And desiring the Governor will make use of his Authority & do every thing in his Power to discountenance such Practices It is therefore ordered That a Proclamacon do forthwith Issue to Enjoin & Require all Justices of the Peace & other Officers & Persons to use their utmost diligence to Detect & apprehend all such Seamen as are suspected to have deserted from any of his Majesty's Ships or other Vessels & to Convey them from Constable to Constable till they be delivered into the Custody of the Officers of some of his Majesty's Ships And to put in Execucon the Laws relating to the apprehending of Runaway Seamen And that no Ferryman shall suffer any Sailor by his Permission to pass over any River or Travel thro' this Colony without a proper Certificate under the hand & seal of the Master of the Vessel to which he belongs as they will Answer it at their Peril

Upon Reading the Petition of Alexander Spalding John Lidderdale & John Hutchins Merchants Setting forth that the Petitioners have bought a Considerable Quantity of Indian Corn in North Carolina & as the Navigation of that place is both difficult & dangerous for Vessels of Burthen Pray that they may be permitted to send such smaller Vessels as are fit to go over the Barr and that they may have the Indulgence of Exporting the same Indian Corn so by them Imported into this Colony from Carolina in such Vessels as they shall have occasion to Charter for that purpose The Board taking the matter into Consideracon are of opinion it is reasonable the Petitioners should have Liberty to fetch the Corn they have purchased in North Carolina in the manner by them desired & that they shall also have liberty to Export the same on Condition that it be first brought on Shore & lodged in Some

Storehouse either at Hampton or Norfolk in the lower District of James River But before such landing the Naval Officer of that District is to have proper Notice from the Master of the Vessel importing the same to the end that he may take an Account of the Quantity & have sufficient proof that the said Indian Corn was actually & bona fide purchased in North Carolina & Imported by the Petitioners And they are also to enter into Bond in the penalty of five hundred pounds not to export any Indian Corn but what has been purchased & imported by them as aforesaid during the Continuance of the Prohibition.

The Governor was pleased to lay before the Board several Letters from Colonel James Patton of Augusta County, Giving an Account of a Body of Indians with some few white Men Supposed to be French appearing in an Hostile manner amongst them killing & carrying off their Horses &c, Whereupon Cap<sup>t</sup> Buchannan & Cap<sup>t</sup> M'Dowell mustered their people together & came up with them on the 18<sup>th</sup> Instant and sent a Man with a signal of Peace which man they killed on the Spot & fired on the white People which they returned & after an Engagement of about forty five Minuits the Indians fled leaving Eight or Ten of their Men dead having killed Cap<sup>t</sup> M'Dowell & about seven or eight of our People & wounded several others He further adds that he hears of many Indians on



the Frontiers & desires Direcons & assistance with a Supply of arms and ammunition The Board taking this matter into Consideracon It is Ordered that an immediate Supply of Arms & Ammunition be sent to Col<sup>o</sup> Patton to be distributed by him amongst the people amongst the people [*sic*] of that County to enable them to defend themselves in Case the Indians should be so hardy as to make another Attempt upon them And that the Commanding Officers of the Countys of Orange and Fairfax have Notice to hold themselves in Readiness to March to their Assistance upon any Emergency or Apprehension of another Attack And as an Encouragement & for the Relief of such poor Widows & Family's as have been Sufferers by these Hostilities It is Ordered that the Receiver General do Issue the sum of Twenty Pistoles to be sent to Col<sup>o</sup> Patton to be distributed by him to such as he thinks proper Objects for that Charity And that some proper Medicines be also sent for the use of those Persons who have been wounded in this Skirmish And to prevent the like Attempts for the future The Board desire the Governor will be pleased to write to the Governor [of] New York representing this Affair to him that he may make an enquiry at the next meeting of the Indian Commissioners at Albany what Nation these Indians belong to & upon what pretence they have Committed these Hostilities & Depredations upon our People If they have any Demands upon us for Lands for which they pretend not to have received a Satisfaccon Let us know their Demand and upon Notice of the time and place appointed for the next meeting of the Indian Commissioners this Government will send Commissioners to meet & treat with them upon that Subject And are ready to make Satisfaccon for any reasonable Demand.

The Officers of the Revenue then representing That in Obedience to the Direction of this Honourable Board in April last that his Majestys Revenue of Quit Rents can not be remitted at this Time for less than 33 1/3 per Cent for Exchange (the Price of Bills being so considerably risen since the War with France) they had stated the Account of that Revenue accordingly and instead of the Article of 5 3/4 per Cent (which had formerly been allowed) had charged the Account with 12 1/2 per Cent to enable the Receiver General to remit the

same by Bills of Exchange to London which with the present Exchange thereon and  $16\frac{2}{3}$  per Cent received from the People just makes up the said  $33\frac{1}{3}$  per Cent and praying that the honourable the Lieutenant Governor will be pleased to certify to the R<sup>t</sup> honble the Lords Commissioners of His Majestys Treasury the necessity of the said Charge at this Time

Defend our Coast without the least assistance from our Neighbours when our Station Ships have been called to the Northward

His Majesty's Letter and Sign Manual dated the sixteenth of March 1748/9 appointing Philip Grymes Esq<sup>r</sup> one of his Majesty's Council of State for this Colony having been read, He accordingly upon taking the Oaths appointed by Act of Parliament, and the Oath of Office, was admitted of the Council.

Upon Reading the Copy of an Order of Court for Culpepper County recommending the Land of M<sup>r</sup> Robert Coleman as the most convenient Place, whereon to erect the Court House, it is

Ordered, That the Court House for the said County, be accordingly there erected and established.

The Governor acquainting the Board that he had taken his Passage with Capt Robinson, who for his better Accommodation had agreed to leave out one hundred and fifty Hogsheads of Tobacco, the Council, on Consideration thereof, were pleased to order the Receiver General to pay his Honour three Hundred Pounds Sterling to satisfy the Captain for the Loss of so much Freight.

In Pursuance of his Majesty's Instructions of March last communicated by the Governor to the Board, Leave is granted to John Hanbury of London Merchant, Thomas Lee Esq<sup>r</sup>, Thomas Nelson Esq<sup>r</sup>, Colonel Cressup, Colonel William Thornton, Daniel Cressup, John Carlyle, Lawrence Washington, Augustine Washington, George Fairfax, Jacob Gyles, Nathaniel Chapman, and James Woodrop Esq<sup>rs</sup> to take up and Survey two Hundred thousand Acres betwixt Romanetto's and Buffalo's Creek, on the South Side of the River Alligane, otherwise the Ohio, and betwixt the two Creeks and the yellow Creek on the North Side of the River, or in such other Parts of the West of the Great Mountains, as shall be

adjudged most proper by the Petitioners for making Settlements thereon, free from the Payment of any Rights, as also from the Payment of any Quit Rents for the Space of Ten Years, and then to pay only the usual Quit Rents for so much of the said Lands as they shall have cultivated within that Time, on Condition that they erect a Fort on the said Lands, and place a sufficient Garrison therein for the Security and Protection of the Settlers, and likewise, seat at their proper Expence an Hundred Families thereon in seven Years, and that no Person already possessed of Lands in this Colony, held of his Majesty by Quit Rent be admitted to take up or settle any of the Lands granted to the Petitioners without giving Security for continuing the Payment of the Quit Rents for the Lands by them heretofore possessed, notwithstanding their Removal; and that they do not interfere with any Grants already made, And as soon as the said two hundred thousand Acres shall be settled, a Fort erected, and a sufficient Garrison placed therein, they have Leave to take up and survey three hundred thousand Acres more, under the like Restrictions and Conditions as for the first two hundred thousand Acres, and adjoining thereto within the said Limits.<sup>133</sup>

A Consciousness of my Inability has made me long decline all publick Business, and determines me no more to interfere with any Affairs of the Government during the Incapacity I at present labour under. The Council, having taken the Subject Matter of the said Letter into Consideration were unanimously of Opinion, that John Custis Esq<sup>r</sup> is utterly incapable of managing the Business of the Government, which, by the Governor's Commission is, in his absence, to devolve on the said John Custis, as being the first of the Council: that it was absolutely necessary for his Majesty's Service, and the Safety, Honour, and Interest of this Colony, that the said John Custis be suspended from the Place of a Member of this Board, and therefore advised the Governor to suspend him accordingly. Upon which Advice, as well as his own Knowledge of the Incapacity of the said John Custis, the Governor was pleased to declare the said John Custis suspended from acting as a Member of his Majesty's Council; and to order the Clerk to give Notice hereof to Thomas Lee Esq next of the Council, and desire him to come down to Williamsburg, with all convenient Speed, and ap-

point a Council to swear him into the Execution of his Office, immediately on the Governor's Departure.

M<sup>r</sup> President was pleased to lay before the Board the following Case. "The Reverend M<sup>r</sup> Eleazer Robertson arrived here lately from England under an Engagement to teach a School for the annual Salary of Sixty pounds, but the Contractors being unable to stand to their Agreement, he applyed for a Recommendation to a Parish; he was well recommended, in all Respects qualified for the ministerial Office, and brought in with him all requisite Powers, (except a Certificate from the Lord Bishop of London of his being conformable to the Doctrine and Discipline of the Church of Eng-

land,) all which were produced":<sup>184</sup> and his Honour desired the Opinion of the Council, whether his Majestys Instruction requiring such Certificate, might under these Circumstances be dispensed with.

The Council having considered the Case, were of Opinion that his Majesty's Instruction ought to be adhered to, and that the said M<sup>r</sup> Robertson could not at present be absolutely preferred to any Ecclesiastical Benefice, but might be recommended to a Living, and receiv'd, on Condition of his obtaining by the first convenient Opportunity a Certificate from the Bishop of London; and it was their Advice that M<sup>r</sup> Commissary wou'd be pleased to write, and to represent the whole of the Case to his Lordship.

The Council having taken under their Consideration, the ruinous Condition of the Governor's House, thought proper that it shou'd be surveyed by some skilful Persons, and an Estimate made by them of the Charge of putting it in good Repair; and were pleased to appoint M<sup>r</sup> James Wray and M<sup>r</sup> Richard Taliaferro for that Purpose, and ordered the Clerk to give Notice to them thereof, and desire that they would forthwith carefully view and inspect the said House, and make a Report as soon as possibly they could of the Expencc which they shou'd judge the Reparation might amount to.

per Cargo of the said Ship Subjects of his Catholic Majesty the King of Spain, Setting forth that they laded with Goods chiefly Appertaining to the Commerce of Europe at Cadiz, And Sailed from thence the Twenty first of October last N:S:<sup>136</sup> to La Vera Cruze and Discharged her Cargo, and laded there with the Effects of that Place, and proceeded from thence to the Havana where they Loaded with Sugar, Logwood, and other Merchandize, and Sailed from thence the Eighteenth of August last N:S: bound to Old Spain under the Convoy of Don Daniel Huony<sup>137</sup> Commander of One of His Catholic Majesty's Ships of War the Galga and Proceeded on their said Voyage till the Twenty Sixth of the same Month when a Hurricane began and Continued Seven Days and Nights and was so Violent that their Tiller was twice carried away and their Fore top masts, so that they had no Government of the said Vessel but were intirely left to the Mercy of the Seas, till the Crew Cutt away the Mizon Mast, that the Timbers of the Head of the said Ship were so Started and weaken'd that she became so Leaky that she had Nine Feet Water between her Decks which Oblig'd them to Scuttle her Decks to let the Water to her Pumps, and tho' they were Incessantly Pumping could Scarce keep her on Float, altho' they had thrown her Guns, and part of her Loading overboard, that they Continued in such Distress till the first of this Instant when a Canoe came on board and inform'd them where they were, on which they Proceeded to Hampton and reported to the Collector what they were, with what they were loaded, and the Cause of their Coming into that Port, but finding the Ship Continued Leaky, and that to be an unsafe Harbour, they Proceeded to Norfolk, where they still remain in the same Distress; and pray'd Relief.

It appearing to the Board that the Petetion is true.

On the Petition of John Kelly Commander of the Ship Saint Peter belonging to Lisbon mostly English Subjects, Setting forth that he Sailed from Lisbon, May 1749 bound for Carthagená with Bale Goods, that he arriv'd there, reloaded with Cocoe, Dyewood, and Money, called at the Havana, from whence he Sailed in Company with Comodore Daniel Huoný one of his Catholic Majesty's Ships of War, and Five more Merchant Men, on the Twenty Sixth of August he met with a violent Hurricane which Continued Seven Day's, Stove in his Stern, carried away his Boats, Six foot Water in the Hold, which Oblig'd him to throw overboard Several Merchandize to prevent the Vessel from foundering, all which was the Cause of his bearing away for Virginia.

The Board being Satisfyed of the truth of the Particulars set forth in this Petition, made the same Order as in the Preceding.

On the Petition of Captain Don Juan Manuel de Bonilla Commander of the Ship Nostra Siniora de Guadalupe a Subject of His Catholic Majesty the King of Spain, and one of the Fleet under the Convoy of Daniel Huoný Comodore, Setting forth that on the thirty first of August last at a Place called Ocacock in North Carolina the said Ship was drove a Shore many Miles from any Inhabitants, that it is impossible to get her off, the Place being encompass'd with Small Islands, that they are now in the utmost Distress for Provisions and other Necessaries, and have been oblig'd to unload the said Ship and put her Cargo on Shore where it is liable to the Damage of the Weather.

It appearing to the Board that the Petition is true.

The President was pleas'd to Express himself in the following manner.

Gentlemen of the Council,

By the unhappy Death of the late President you are very Sensible the Administration of the Government Devolves upon me, and it is for that reason I have called a Council to Qualify my self by taking the Oaths to the Government and the Oath of Office to enable myself to Discharge that important Trust, and I hope my very ill State of Health will Sufficiently plead my Excuse, for giving you the trouble of meeting here; the long Course of the Wise and Prudent Government of S<sup>r</sup> William Gooch the happy Influence of which we enjoy'd for above Twenty Years, and the Administration of the late Worthy President of the Council, a Gentleman very liberally endued by Nature, and those Endowments highly improv'd by a long and Assiduous Application and Business, which render'd him Highly Serviceable to his Country. and very justly gained him the Publick Applause, the Shining figure these Gentlemen made in the Government will I am affraid set me in a very Disadvantageous Light who am now to Succeed them, but when I reflect upon my own Disability, it will teach me to have recourse to the Inexhaustible Fountain of Wisdom, and to implore the Assistance of that Glorious being who Delights in Manifesting his Strength in Weakness: And as it has pleas'd God to Distinguish me with the Honour of Representing a King so Eminently Conspicuous for his Princely Virtues and Paternal Affection to his Subjects, I shall be in hopes he will enlighten me with a Portion of his Divine Wisdom, and that join'd with the plentiful Stock wherewith he has Blessed you, upon whose Counsels and Advice I shall always rely, that I shall be able to Render a Satisfactory Account of my Administration to his Majesty by Supporting the just prerogative of the Crown, and Manifesting a Proper regard to the liberties of his Subjects.

Then Lord Albemarle's Commission was order'd to be Read; after which M<sup>r</sup> President took the Oaths appointed to be taken by Act of Parliament instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremecy and took and Suhscribed the Oath of Abjuration and Suhscribed the Test, was also Sworn to Observe the Acts of Trade, and faithfully to Discharge the Office of Commander in chief of his Majesty's Colony of Virginia,

Order'd that a Proclamation immediately Issue for Continueing all Publick Officers in their Respective Places.

The President Desiring the Opinion of the Council whether there was any Extraordinary Occasion for holding an Assembly soon.

It was the Advice of the Council that his Honour would he pleas'd to Acquaint the Secretary of State that the Act of Assembly having a Duty on Slaves for the Support of this Government, will expire on the last day of July next, and that it will be Expedient to hold an Assembly to Continue that Law and to lay a Levy to pay the Publick Debts, pursuant to His Majesty's Instruction now in force unless he shall receive Orders to the Contrary.

The President Acquainted the Board, that he Yesterday gave an Audience to the Chiefs of the Cherokee Indians and spoke to them in these words.

Friends and Brethren:

I heartily Congratulate you upon your safe Arrival in Williamsburg; and hope in your Journey through the Inhabitants of this Colony, you have met with kind treatment and Hospitable entertainment. You may be well Assured that every thing will be Provided for you, whilst you Continue here, to render the Place agreeable to you. I hope you left our Good Friend and Brother the Em-

peror of the Cherokee Nation in Health, and the Nation itself in Prosperity. I have appointed this meeting to give you an Opportunity of Communicating to me the important Business that has brought you to this City, thro' such a vast Extent of Country.

To which the Chief of them return'd the following Answer

Brother :

We sett off from the Town of Choto, to visit you, and Learn what you had to say to us; Our Emperor sent us here to acquaint the Governor of Virginia that when his Father was in England, the King directed and advised him to apply to the Governor of Virginia or Carolina when ever the Cherokee's were in want of any thing. We are just come down, and have now seen our Brother and the rest of our Friends. We are instructed to inform you that four years ago we waited upon the Governor of South Carolina to endeavour to prevail on him to encourage a Trade between the Subjects of that Colony and the Cherokees, and to Supply us with Ammunition and other Necessaries, which he promised to do but has not perform'd. this was the Principal Cause of our coming here, and the Experience we have had of the Path to Carolina being very Difficult and incommodious for Carrying on a Trade there an Additional Reason. Moreover the Governor of Carolina has Furnish'd the Creek Indians our Enimies with Ammunition and what they want, and giving them very Distinguishing Tokens of kindness. Upon these Considerations our Emperor has sent us to Sollicit a Confirmation of your friendship, and to Desire that you will be pleas'd to send white People amongst us, and Establish a Commerce between the King of Great Britain's Subjects Inhabitants of this Dominion, and the Indians of the Cherokee Nation. If our request is Granted, we promise to make a Road to Facilitate a Trade between us; and as we are at War with all the French Indians, we will guard the Road, and Secure the Inhabitants of Virginia in passing to our Towns, and be Accountable for any loss they may Sustain, King George told our Emperor that when any of the Inhabitants of Virginia or Carolina were at War with the French we must assist them, which we are, and alway's shall be ready to do.

That to this he reply'd.

Friends and Brethren:

What you have imparted to me is of so much Consequence, that it is Necessary for me to take the Advice of His Majesty's Council upon it, before I can return you an Answer.

And that Accordingly he now desir'd their Advice upon it.

On Consideration whereof it was the Advice of the Council that his Honour would inform the said Indians that this Government will give all Possible encouragement to the Inhabitants of this Colony who shall be inclined, to Trade with them; and that a present of Two Hundred Pounds be made them besides their Expences.

Order'd that the Receiver General pay the Sum of Fifty Pounds to Colonel James Patton for his Trouble in Conducting the Cherokee Indians to Williamsburg And back to his House, which is, Two Hundred Miles Distant

Order'd that the Receiver General pay Humberstone Lyon Thirty five Pounds for Damages done to him by the Northward Indians, to Samuel Stalnaker Twenty Pounds and to Nathaniel Wiltshire Seven Pounds on the same Account, also to Ebenezer Westcoat, Three Pounds three Shillings and Six pence for Damages done him by the said Indians, and for Victualling many of them at Different times.

August the Tenth 1751

The President this Day gave a Second Audience to the Cherokees, and made the following Speech to them

Friends and Brethren:

The Business you imparted to me the other day, I have Communicated to his Majesty's Council, and by their Advice assure you that the Government will always endeavour to Cultivate a Harmony and Good Correspondence between his Majesty's Subjects and our friends the Cherokees and you may depend upon all due encouragement being given to the Inhabitants that shall be inclined to Trade with you, for our Mutual Benefit, and as a Pledge of our Friendship, and good wishes that a lasting Peace and Flourishing Trade may be establish't between us, I make you a Present of Two Hundred Pounds out of which I have directed a handsome present to be made to the Emperor

of Choto, as a Mark of our Esteem and Friendship for him, and likewise a Present to your Interpreter, and the remainder to be divided between you according to your Direction.

To which the Chief Answer'd

Brother :

We have Travell'd through Bushes and Bryers, to see our friends of Virginia, we have no cause to Repent of our long and tedious Journey, the pain and Fatigue we have undergone are Compensated by the kind and Generous Reception we have met with, we are pleas'd with your talk, and shall make a faithful Relation of it to our Emperor. Our Hearts are Strait, we shall always preserve in them what we have heard from you, and ever Retain a Grateful Remembrance of your Favours. We have given our Promise to make a good Road for the People of this Country who shall be Dispos'd to Trade with us, and to protect and Secure them from all Dangers, which we shall Steadfastly adhere to, You have Supply'd all our wants, We have nothing to Desire but the Continuance of your Friendship.

After which the President took them all by the Hand, wish'd them a good Journey home, and prosperity to their Emperor and the Cherokee Nation.

The President on the Application of Captain Whitwell Communicated a Letter to him from R: Roddam Commander of the Greyhound at New York, Dated the 17<sup>th</sup> of June last, Signifying that he had receiv'd a Letter from Lord Collvell Commander of His Majesty's Ship Success at Boston bearing Date the 9<sup>th</sup> of June Setting forth that the Governor and Council of that Province had receivd certain Intelligence that a French Ship of War Carrying Thirty Six Guns and Three Hundred Men Sail'd up the Bay of Fundy the 26<sup>th</sup> of the preceeding Month, which gives Suspicion that the French are endeavouring to



Strengthen [sic] themselves there, and hold Possession of that Place by Force, that he is about to Sail for Hallifax in Nova Scotia, and desirous of his meeting him there, but that his having been some time under Orders from the Lords of the Admiralty to proceed to England with Governor Clinton prevents his joining Lord Colville, therefore thinks it Adviseable for him to make the best of his way to Hallifax, with the Ship under his Command, in the same manner as he himself was by Lord Colvill's Letter desired to do, a Copy whereof was inclosed.

The Council upon Considering the lateness of the Season, and the length of time Elapsed since these Letters were written, where [*i. e.* were] of Opinion that Captain Whitwell's Complying with Captain Roddams Request, and leaving his Station at this Juncture might be Injurious to the Trade of this Country, and not likely to prove of any Advantage to His Majesty's Service.

Order'd that a New Commission of the Peace Issue for the County of King William, that Bernard Moore, and Philip Aylett Gent: be reinstated in their Place, and that Peter Robinson, Richard Squire Taylor, John Quarles, and James Richeson, Gent: be added.

Order'd that the Receiver General Pay George Camp, Fifty Pounds for his Expences and Trouble in Maintaining the Cherokee Indians.

Order'd that the Receiver General pay James Bird, Sixteen Pounds for Several Journey's on the Governments Service.

Sir,

This Letter which I write you by the Advice of his Majesty's Hon<sup>ble</sup> Council of this Province, is upon Indian Affairs a very serious and Important Subject, and as you cannot be throughly acquainted with the Affairs of the Cherokees and other Indian Nations depending upon this Government as we are; I shall before I take any Notice of what has lately happened in Virginia, endeavour to give you a Short historical Account of that Nation called the Cherokees and I shall confine myself to the Period of one and Twenty years, for it is about that Time, since Six of their Chiefs, or head Men deputed by the Nation were carryed to England from Charles Town in his Majesty's Ship the Fox; they were graciously received by his Majesty, and a Treaty was concluded with that Nation there, the Title of which is as follows, "Articles of Friendship and Commerce proposed by the Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations to the Deputies of the Cherokee Nation in South Carolina by his Majesty's Order on Monday September the 7<sup>th</sup> 1730" and in the said Treaty after his Majesty had expressed his Satisfaction that the great Nation of the Cherokees had sent them so great a way to brighten the Chain of Friendship between him and them, and had Signify'd to them his desire that it should be a perpetual Friendship, there follows a Clause in these words "the Great King and the Cherokee Indians being thus fasten'd together by the Chain of friendship, he has Order'd his People and Children the English in Carolina to trade with the Indians and to furnish them with all manner of Goods that they want, and to make Haste to build Houses, and to plant Corn from Charles Town towards the Town of the Cherokees behind the great Mountains the Cherokees must treat the English as Bretheren of the same family, and must be always ready at the Governor's Command to fight again[s]t any Nation The Cherokees shall not permit the white men of any Nation to build any Forts, Cabins, or plant Corn amongst them, or near to any of the Indian Towns and if any such attempt shall be made they must Acquaint the English Governor therewith, and do what ever he directs in Order to Defend and Maintain the great King's Right to the Country of Carolina. That if any Negro Slaves shall run away the Cherokee Indians shall endeavour to Apprehend them and bring them back to the Governor. If an Indian kills an Englishman y<sup>e</sup> Indian who did it shall be delivered up to the Governor. In the Answer of the Indian Chiefs, are these words "Here stands the Governor of Carolina whom we know, this small Rope we

shew you is all we have to bind our Selves with, and may be broken, but you have Iron Chains for Yours, however if we catch your Slaves we shall bind them as well as we can and deliver them to our Friends again, and have no pay for it. Your white People may very safely build Houses near us we shall hurt Nothing that belong to them, for we are the Child of one Father the Great King and shall live and Die together. These Indians were sent from England with the Governor of this Province who also brought with him the above Treaty that had been concluded in so Solemn an manner and to which he him self had been a Witness. It was received with great Joy by the Cherokee Nation and ratified by them, and yet within two or three Years afterwards, their behaviour was so very irregular, that it threatened much confusion to this Country upon which the Governor with the Advice of the Council Order'd all the Traders to leave that Nation with their Goods, and then Stop'd all Trade and Commerce with them that by shewing them their wants they might be brought to a Sense of their Duty, and an Observance of the Treaty, and having heard that some people were going into that Nation with Goods and Ammunition from the back parts of Virginia, he sent a Party of Men to intercept them who very happily met with them upon the Road and Compel'd them to bring their Good to one of our Forts, this lucky Incident prevented the Spilling of much blood, for the Cherokees had Solicited the Catabaws, and other Indians to join them in a War against this Province but having no Ammunition, they were obliged to desist from their designs, and soon after sent down some of their Head Men to acknowledge their Faults and to promise a Strict observation of the Treaty for the Future But they did not long continue in their good Temper for a few Years afterwards. they renewed their Injuries to us, and gave us fresh occasion to Complain to them of their Infracation of the Treaty; at that Time also the Government thought it Adviseable to withdraw our Traders from them, and to stop the Trade but some of their Head Men unwilling to make satisfaction & desirous to have ammunition Else where, designing if they could procure a supply to make us feel the force of it went to Virginia, and Complained to M<sup>r</sup> Gooch, that this Province would not let them have a Trade earnestly praying that he would permit Traders from thence to carry Goods and Ammunition amongst them, but as I am informed, he very Prudently told them that the Province of Carolina must have good reasons for their conduct, and therefore their best way would be to adjust their differences with them. But what may be the Consequences of Your late Conduct I shall not say I pray God it be

not an Indian War or that the Cherokee Nation, at present the Barrier of this Province, against the French an[d] their Indians be not intirely lost to the British Interest. However I shall proceed to Inform you that I have an Instruction from his Majesty under his Royal Sign Manal to preserve Peace and Friendship with all our Indians but chiefly with the Cherokees; in Consequence of which Instruction and also because I know that the Security of this Province greatly depends upon it, I have made it my Study to cultivate a Good understanding betwixt that Nation and us But Notwithstanding of all my Care, and of the very great Expencc that this Province has been annually at upon their account, the Injuries lately committed by some of their People has been such as made it Necessary for this Government to call the offenders to an Account. For a few months ago some of their People attack'd one of our Inhabitants even within our Settlements, with an Intent to murder him, tho' the Bullets did not kill him, but went through his Arm others of them lately burn'd to the Ground a Traders House and killed one of the People belonging to it, others again fell upon our Traders in their Nation, broke open their Stores and publicly divided the Goods, as if they had been Spoils taken from an Enemy, obliging the Traders to fly for the Preservation of their Lives while they Pursued in Order to destroy them. These are Crimes in all Countries and Violations of the Laws of Nations known to be so by the most barbarous People, but they are in a Particular manner Infractions of the Treaty subsisting between them and us, as you may perceive by the above extracts from it; and yet Sir, (I speak it with Astonishment) these are the People, the very indentical Persons, who came with compl<sup>ts</sup> to you against this Government, and whom you have received with open Arms, and Caress'd in a ver[y] extraordinary manner, Complaints which are well known to be without the least Foundation and as false as all the rest of the Speech that they made to you if they really made the Speech that is printed in the Virginia Gazette; which in truth does not very much seem to be in the Indian Style, but it had been happy for this Province and for the British Interest, if that Interview had ended with fine Speeches only, But we are Inform'd That these Embassadors, and nobles as they are called, tho' most of them are really obscure Fellows, and who were to have been delivered up to us by their Country Men to be punished as their Crimes deserv'd, have receiv'd very large presents from you, possibly of Arms and Ammunition with a Promise of being Supply'd with more by encouraging of Traders to carry them from Virginia. This, Sir, has been so highly

injurious to this Province that I am advised by the Council to lay this whole Affair before his Majesty and in the Mean Time to write you this Letter to desire that you will give no Permission to any Traders from Virginia to carry Goods, Arms, or Amunition to that Nation, but on the Contrary, that if any are set off you will be so Good as to send and [*sic*] express after them without Loss of Time, and to recall them and to bring them back with their Goods, even if they are in the Nation and to acquaint you that I have also by their Advice sent an Officer, and a Part of a Troop in the pay of this Government to Stop them. It is below this Government to take notice of the Speech made to you by the Indians upon any other Account than to shew you how Grossly you have been Imposed upon by them. The Person called one of the Kings of the Cherokee Indians, who is said in the Virginia Gazette to have arrived lately at Williamsburgh with Eight of his Nobles, and Many Attendants, is well known to the Inhabitants here by the Name of the Little Carpenter, and by his strong attachment to the French he being their only Advocate in that Nation and whom we had demanded by Name to be deliver'd up to us, as the principal Instigator and Fomenter of all Mischief And his Nobles are composed chiefly of the Fellows that lately broke open a Store of One of our Traders, and rob'd him of his Goods, and whom the Emperor and most of the Head Men have positively promised shall be deliver'd up to me to be punish'd. He that speaks for the rest says that they had set off from Chote to learn what you had to say to them, which looks as if they had been invited or sent for; he says that there Emperor sent them to acquaint you that when his Father was in England the King directed him to Apply to the Governor of Virginia or Carolina. I must inform you That this Person called the Emperor has no great Authority but in his own Town of Teligno, of which he is King or Head Man, and where he constantly resides; his Father never was in England in his Life, nor did the King ever direct the Cherokees, or any of them to Apply to the Governor of Virginia but to the Governor of Carolina. He says that some years ago they waited on the Governor of South Carolina to endeavour to prevail on him to encourage a Trade between the Subjects of that Colony & the Cherokees, and to Supply them with Ammunition and other Necessaries which he promised to do but has not performed: it is false that they ever made any such Application, and it would have been a very ridiculous one, since they have been abundantly supply'd with every thing from this Province for near forty Years, and he has Assign'd as an Additional Reason for their going

there, the Experience they have had that the Path to Carolina was difficult and incommodious for carrying on a trade there; the Distance of many of our Settlements from the Cherokee Towns is no more than Seventy Miles, the Number of our Traders constantly residing in that Nation and the Great Quantity of Goods that they dayly carry thither, might have convinced the Indians How Convenient and easy the Path was to their Nation from Carolina; and their own Experience and Knowledge of the Goodness of our Road, might have confirmed them in that Opinion, they having often trod it heavy loaded with Presents from hence. He says Moreover that the Governor of Carolina had furnished the Creek Indians their Enemies with Amunition and other Necessaries, and given them very distinguishing Tokens of kindness. The Creeks and Cherokees are equally Friend to the English, and are both in Treaty with this Government and therefore the Governor of Carolina has Treated them both without any distinction, and has Laboured with great Diligence to extinguish the Flame of War which was kindled & kept alive by the Artifices of the French; and two years ago he sent for the Emperor and Head Men of the Cherokee Nation and all the Head Men of the Creek Nation to Charles Town, where they were entertain'd several weeks at the Expencc of the Publick and had large presents made, and where both Nations were made Friends, and a Peace concluded betwixt them which lasts to this Hour betwixt the upper Creeks & upper Cherokees where the Town of Chote is, from whence these people come, tho' some of the lower Towns in each Nation have had differences He goes on to say that upon these Consideration their Emperor had sent them to Solicit a Confirmation of Your Friendship; in the first part of their Speech they say they had set off from Chote to hear what you had to say to them, and these words "the Confirmation of your Friendship" look as if they had been sent for; and came upon the privious Promise of your Friendship; but the Emperor who they say sent them absolutely denies it, and declares he did not know of their Errand. Having now communicated these several matters to you, and having assured you that if Traders from Virginia, are at present permitted to go to the Cherokees it will be productive of great Mischief occasion them to renew their Insolences, and unavoidably bring on a War; and having in the Name of this Government requested of you to prevent any from going in and to recall such as may be gone, I can hardly doubt of your Compliance with what is so Necessary for his Majesty's Service and so evidently for the safety of this his province, and indeed of all his Dominions

upon the Continent, for an Indian War may soon become General. I impatiently wait your Answer, because if it is such as this Province has reason to Hope, it may be improper for me to Trouble or Alarm his Majesty's Ministers; and it will be agreeable to the Good Correspondence that has hitherto and I hope always shall subsist between Virginia and Carolina that some Paragraph be inserted in Your Gazette that whereas some Cherokee Indians had lately come to W<sup>m</sup>sburgh to disire that Traders might be sent from thence to their Country, in Regard that the Government of Carolina had not supplied them with Goods &<sup>e</sup> you were now certified that what they had said was false and without the least Foundation" or to that Purpose

which Letter being read and duly considered, it was the Advice of the Council, and accordingly Ordered, that a Committee be appointed to Inspect the Journals relating to Indian Affairs, and prepare and [*sic*] Answer to justify the Conduct of this Government towards the Cherokees to Assure Governor Glen that they came here uninvited that as they never carry any written Credentials, we could not but believe and treat them as we did that upon his word we fear we have been imposed on, and shall undeceive the People in this Country, and prohibit all Intercourse and Commerce between our Inhabitants and those Indians when ever we shall learn that they have Committed the least infraction of the Friendship they profess, or shall make an ill use of the Presents we made them, and it was refer'd to William Nelson Richard Corbin and Philip Ludwell Esq<sup>r</sup> to prepare the same.

This Day appear'd according to Summons the Several Persons of the County of Accomack and Northampton to Answer concerning Effects in their Hands belonging to the Spanish Ships cast away on the Eastern Shore who having been Seperately examined



on Oath it was found that the Effects in the Hands of the People in Northampton amounted to the Value of Twelve Pounds one shilling and Six pence; and that the Effects in the Hands of the People of Accomack, amounted to the Value of Twenty two Pounds, and Eleven pence half penny the Account of Sales in Northampton, by the Return of the Sherif amounted to Nine Pounds thirteen Shillings and Seven pence, and the Sales in Accomack to Seventy two Pounds two shillings and two Pence. The Effects in the Possession of the Sherif of Accomack not Sold amount to the Value of Two Pounds Fourteen Shillings and four Pence.

Order'd That the Sherifs be allowed out of the Spanish Effects Five per Cent, on the Sales besides their Expences & Ferriages; that the Persons by whom the Effects were saved be allowed Ten per Cent for their Trouble, and their Ferriages & Expences; and that M<sup>r</sup> Hog retain in his Hands sufficient to satisfy his Expences incur'd from acting under a Power of Attorney from the Commanding Officer, and Account for any Overplus to the Sherif and if their should not be Sufficient, that the Sherif pay out of the Effects in his Hands.

William Nelson Esq<sup>r</sup> reported that they had drawn an Answer to Governor Glen's Letter, which was read, and unanimously approved, and is as follows,

Virginia October 25<sup>th</sup> 1751

Sir,

I have received your Letter of the Eighteenth of the last Month and as I found it to contain matter of the greatest Importance to his Majesty's Service, I have taken the Advice of his Council upon

it, and the following Answer is the Result of their Deliberations. And first, I am to Assure your Excellency that so far was this Government from inviting that Body of the Cherokee Indians to the late Interview at Williamsburgh which Your Excellency in Your Letter seems to Suspect that upon the first Intelligence from the Commanding Officer of the County where they entered this Colony of their Intentions to come here, Immediately Order'd him to Use all Possible Endeavours to prevent their Proceeding further if it could be done consistantly with good manners and this strong Desire I had to divert their coming proceeded from an Opinion, that any Matters they could have to communicate to this Government relative to the establishing & encouraging a Trade with them, could not from the Remoteness of their Situation, prove of any Advantage to this Country and from an Opinion that their Visit would be attended with Considerable Expence to us. But when I found my Endeavours to Stop them were ineffectual and that they were arrived in Town much sooner than could have been expected if they had received the Greatest Encouragement, I then judg'd it for his Majesty's Service to treat them with such degrees of Hospitality and Kindness as are due to Nations of Indians in Amity with his Majesty and particularly with this Colony. And Notwithstanding, Sir, you knew these Men were a set of Impostors, and such as rather deserve Punishment for their Insolence and cruelties to the Inhabitants of Your Province, than Caresses they met with here; yet as the Indians are an illiterate People, and have no publick Token or Seal to Give a Sanction to any Instructions they may charge their Embassadors with, it was impossible for us to discover whether they came properly Impower'd or not for we could only judge from Circumstances and these Indians Informing us, that they had moved a great way to the Northward of their former Settlement and Near the Limits of this Colony for the sake of better Land and fresh Hunting Ground, seem'd so plausible that we could not discredit them; and therefore we gave them full Assurance that this Government would encourage any of his Majesty's Subjects to Trade with them that should have an Inclination, and made them such Presents as were thought Necessary to facilitate a Scheme, which from their Nearer Approach to us seem'd Then to Promise great Advantages to the Trade of this Colony. And now, Sir, in our Circumstances being ignorant of the Outrages these Indians had committed in Your Province, it was almost impossible from the

Little Communication between us, that we should be otherwise permit me to Ask your Excellency what other Part I could have Acted consistant with my Duty to the King, and the true Interest of the People of this Colony. Motives of the highest Influence, and by which this Government is ever actuated in its Deliberations. These Men in their Appearance were a Set of poor indigent People who came hither to seek the bare Necessaries of their Subsistance which they said they could find no where else; and we were very Credibly inform'd that they had many Consultations whether they should Apply to this Government or the French to supply them with Goods, and at last concluded to come to us before they enter'd into a Treaty with the French & if we had refused them any Relief in their Distress would not this in all human Probability have forced [them] into the French Interest<sup>e</sup> who are always ready to receive them with Open Arms, and who have their Agents ever watchful to make advantage of every Little misunderstanding between the Indians and us, I cannot but observe that it is an unusual Vein of reasoning to think that Acts of Friendship and Kindness from the English to the Indians should procure their Enmity; surely a contrary Treatment of them is more likely to produce such and [sic] Effect: and I have good Grounds to hope, that the small presents they have received from us will not be attended with such fatal Consequences, as your Excellency seems to Apprehend since I am Informed that from and [sic] Imprudence not uncommon to Indians, they left the greatest part of them before they passed the Bounds of this Colony. However since we are now Sensible from the Characters your Excellency has Given them that we have been much imposed upon and to convince your Excellency of the Sincerity of our Intentions to preserve the Good Understanding that has so long and so happily subsisted between your Government and ours, I shall take care to Inform the Publick of the Baseness of their Behaviour towards Your People, and of the Falsity of their Complaints against you. This I flatter myself will give your Excellency full Satisfaction upon the Subject, at least I dou[b]t not when these motives of our Conduct shall be coolly and impartially considered by our Superiors, they will Clearly justify us before them. If any further Steps shall be judged necessary to be taken for preserving the Indians firm to the British Interest, you may rely

on the Chearful Concurrence of this Government I have the Honour to be your Excellency's

The following Paragraph is Ordered to be inserted in the Virginia Gazette, A Letter from the Governor of South Carolina Advises, that the Cherokees, who were lately in Williamsburgh, under the Character and Denomination of Embassadors and Nobles are People of no Eminent Quality or Dignity, but obscure Persons; that they had committed many Cruelties, and Injuries to the Inhabitants of that Province and were to have been delivered up by their Country Men to be punished; that it is false that they ever made Application to the Governor of Carolina, or had not been furnished with Good, they having been abundantly supply'd with every thing by that Province for near Forty Years: This Intelligence is therefore inserted in the Gazette, that the Inhabitants of this Colony may be Cautious in their Commerce with them.

To Henry Beard an inclusive Patent for three Surveys in Albemarle already made but not yet Patented lying on the Branches of Willis's River the Quantity not Exceeding One Thousand Acres.

To Sherwood Walton and Joseph Walton Three Thousand Acres in Lunenburgh on both Sides of Banister River to include Five Thousand three Hundred and two Acres granted to Richard Eckols and Purchased by the Petitioner.

To John Yarrington and James Machan Ten Thousand Acres in Lunenburgh on Slaitstone Creek the South side of Staunton River

To the same Six Thousand Acres in Lunenburg on the South Fork of Sandy River.

Upon which it was the Advice of the Council that his Honour would be pleased to return for Answer, that they believe M<sup>r</sup> Muntour is deserving of the Character and Recommendation given of him, should be glad of his good Offices, and that he could be prevailed on to reside in Virginia and to meet the Commissioners at his House at the Time fix'd, tho' it is not yet resolv'd on absolutely to engage

him in that Service; and desire M<sup>r</sup> Cresap will Endeavour to learn and obtain from under the Hand of the Magistrate his reason for not Regarding the Complaint made to him. William Fairfax Esq<sup>r</sup> on Behalf of the Council acquainted the Governor that they had Drawn a Representation to his Majesty for an Augmentation of their Salary in Consideration of the great Increase of Business, and the Extraordinary Attendance they are Obliged to Give, as well as for the better enabling them to support the Dignity of their Office which was read and is as follows

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty  
The Humble Representation of the Council  
of State and Judges of General Court of  
this Your Majesty's Antient  
Colony and Dominion of Virginia.

Sheweth.

That the General Assembly taking into their Consideration the great Increase of the Business in the Supreme Court (of which by a Law of this Colony the Council are Constituted Judges without any other appointment or Fees than Your Majesty's Allowance to them) to prevent the evil Consequences arising from a Delay of the Administration of of [*sic*] Justice have thought it Expedient to add Six day's to each Term; so that they are obliged to Attend on that Duty alone at least Two Months in every Year.

That the Business of the Assembly and all the other Services daily increase as the Country becomes more Populous.

That by reason of the remote Scituation of Many of them from the Seat of Government they are not only at a Considerable expence in Attending the Several Branches of their Duty, but also suffer no small Loss through their long Absence from their Estates.

That for all These Services, and to Support the Dignity of their Stations They are at present allowed a Salary of Six Hundred Pounds a Year; payable out of Your Majesty's Revenue of Two Shillings a Hogshead which Fund was established to defray these and other contingent Expences of Government and will now very well admit of a further allowance.

They therefore pray Your Majesty may from your known Goodness and Equity be induced for the future to allow them a Salary more proportionate to the Attendance they are obliged to Give in the several Services to which they have the Honour to be appointed and humbly propose that the Sum of Twelve Hundred Pounds per Annum may be paid them out of the said Fund of Two Shillings a Hogshead which will amount but to One Hundred Pounds a Year to each of them and which in the whole will not exceed the Profits of the Office of a Chief Justice in some of Your Majesty's Plantations in America.

And the Governor was pleased to express his Approbation thereof; and the Council Present desiring his Honour to recommend the same to his Majesty. the Governor promised to do all in his Power towards rendering their Request successfull.

Signifying that he gladly accepted the Offer of being Interpretor promising to be Zealous in Serving this Government & recommending M<sup>r</sup> Andrew Muntour to meet and assist him in the Delivery of his Majesty's Present. Conrad Weiser Esq<sup>r</sup> Appear'd this day in Council and desired he might be disengaged from his promise of serving this Government in the Capacity of Interpreter at the ensuing Treaty at Loggs Town for fear of Offending the Six united Nations of Indians, who being a jealous people, he said he [*sic*]<sup>148</sup> would conclude, that because he could not prevail on them to come to Fredericksburgh to receive his Majesty's Present, he had Advised the Governor of Virginia to Give the Present to the Ohio Indians.

The Accounts of his Majesty's Revenue of 2/ per Hhd Port Duties &c from the 25<sup>th</sup> of April 1752 to the 25<sup>th</sup> of October 1752 being examined by the Deputy Auditor, and made Oath to by the Receiver General, were certified by the Governor as usual.

The following present was ordered for the Six Nations, Viz. Twenty Barrels of powder, 40 Hh<sup>d</sup> of Lead, 100 Small Arms and Bayonets, [...] <sup>152</sup> Vermilion, 5000 Flints; Three Peices of black and white Duffels for Match Coats.

The Board upon the Death of Lawrence Washington Esq<sup>r</sup> late Adjutant, taking under Consideration, the great Advantage of an Adjutant to this Country, in instructing the Officers and Soldiers in the Use and Exercise of their Arms in bringing the Militia to a more regular Discipline, and fitting it for Service, besides polishing and improving the meaner people, and finding by Experience the Insufficiency of one, fully to discharge a Business of so much Importance, it was proposed and agreed to divide the Colony into four Districts, and the following Gentlemen were nominated and approved of, with the Allowance of a Salary of One hundred pounds per Annum to each, Viz,

Thomas Bentley, for the Frontier District containing the Counties of Frederick, Augusta, Hallifax, Lunenburg, and Albemarle.

The Governor acquainting the Board that the Emperor of the Cherokees, his Empress, Son, two Generals, and other Attendants, waited on him the 9<sup>th</sup> of this Instant, and told him they had come through many Briers, Thickets, and great Waters to see him; that he welcom'd them, and promised they should be entertained with great Civility during their Residence in this City, and desired to hear what induced them to take so long and fatiguing a Journey; That thereupon the Emperor by his Interpreter made a Speech as follows,

Brother,

I and my Nation are desirous of cultivating a Trade and Friendship with this Government. The Governor of South Carolina has slighted and neglected us, and has put a Stop to the Traders bringing us a Supply of Goods, so that we are in great Want of all Sorts of Necessaries. The Governor has encouraged and supply'd the Nation of Indians called Creeks, who have been at War with our Nation of Cherokees these three Years past; The Creeks have given great Encouragement to the French, who have actually built a Fort among them,

which the Governor of Carolina was very sensible of, and he knows the Attachment of our Nation has always been strong to the English, as we have a strong Inveteracy and Resentment against the French. We therefore desire you will order your Traders to supply us with Goods, and we will take Care they shall have proper Encouragement and Protection.

After which he produced Articles of Peace and Commerce (sent to his Father) signed in London by the Secretary, Board of Trade &c, That to this Speech he replied.

Brother, Ammoscossity of Great Tellico.

I am very glad to see you, your Empress, Son and Attendants, and shall be always ready to shew all imaginable Regard to any of the Indian Nations that are in Amity with the English, and that acknowledge his Majesty the King of Great Britain, to be their Father, Lord, and Protector.

As to the Complaint against the Governor of South Carolina, I can say nothing to it, till I hear from him, but am sorry any Misunderstanding should subsist between you, and shall be glad if I can be an Instrument to reconcile any such Differences. As South Carolina is more contiguous to your Nation, and your Wants may be more regularly and sooner supply'd from thence, than this Dominion, I recommend you to encourage their Traders to furnish you. In Respect to the Traders here, I have no power to oblige them to go to any particular Nation of Indians to trade, but will let them know the protection you are pleased to promise them. During the Time you shall remain here, I have given Orders to entertain You, your Family and Attendants with all Necessaries.

That after drinking some Wine, they all returned to the House appointed to receive them.

Which being approved of by the Board, a Motion was made and agreed to, that the Emperor might be desired to attend in Council in order to answer the principal Particulars charged by Governor Glen upon the Cherokees, who were here in August 1751. The Emperor was accordingly sent for, and soon appearing, was received into the Council Chamber, and took his Seat in a Chair placed for him. He was presently made acquainted with the Substance of Governor Glen's Letter dated September 18<sup>th</sup> 1751.

He was first interrogated upon the Accusation against the person whom the Governor of Carolina said was known among them by the Name of the Little Carpenter. The Emperor answered that he

had never heard of any Crime committed by that person to draw upon him the Governor's Displeasure; That he was altogether ignorant of his having been concerned in the breaking open any Store; That he had never promised to deliver him up to the Governor; That he was one of his chief Warriors, and actually sent by him to procure a Trade between this Colony and the Cherokees.

He was then asked, what he knew of the Murder complained of.

To this he made Answer, that a party of his people from a remote Settlement, with some No[r]thern Indians, did attack a House upon the Creek path, wherein were some Creeks and white people, that the white Men were called to [*sic*] come out, and several did, but one remaining within, was accidentally killed, for which they excused themselves to the Governor of Carolina last Fall, who forgave it. He said the Governor should have writ of his own Actions; How he had supply'd the Enemies of the English with Ammunition, and how the Creeks had suffered the French to build a Fort among them.

The Emperor being desired to signify what Necessaries they had Occasion for, and what Present would be acceptable, and told that what was given them must not encourage any Difference with the people of Carolina, with whom we live as Children of the same Father, and as in one House; reply'd, that he considered us in that Light, and only requested some Clothes proper for people in their Station, and Ammunition; Being informed, that a handsome Suit of Clothes for himself, his Empress and Son should be got ready, as soon as possible, with proper Cloathing for his people, and also some Arms and Ammunition to defend themselves against their Enemies, he returned Acknowledgements for the Civilities, and kind Reception he had met with and withdrew.

Ordered That the Receiver General pay M<sup>r</sup> Watts, one of the Interpreters for the Cherokees Twenty five Pounds, and M<sup>r</sup> Erwin Patterson the other Interpreter Fifteen pounds besides their Expences in coming hither

M<sup>r</sup> Patterson was directed to accompany the Emperor back to his Territories, and bear the Expences with the promise of being repaid.

Ordered That the Receiver General pay Thomas Calhoun Six pounds nineteen shillings for Damages done him by the Norward Indians.

The Governor communicated to the Board a Letter from the Governor of New York dated 22<sup>d</sup> May 1752 with a Copy of an Order of Council of that Government, purporting that in all Treaties with

the Six Nations of Indians it was expected previous Notice should be given to the Governor of New York, and that Albany was esteemed the properest place for holding any such Treaty.

Upon which, it was the Advice of the Board, that his Honour would be pleased to return for Answer, that Experience had convinced us of the Inconvenience and extraordinary Charge of making Treaties or sending presents out of this Government, that we had fallen upon a more adviseable, and less expensive Method, and that due Attention should always be paid to his Majesty's Service, and the Interests of the neighbouring Provinces.

William Fairfax Esq<sup>r</sup> moved that a Letter might be prepared to the Lords of the Admiralty signifying our Approbation of Cap<sup>t</sup> Whitwell's Conduct during his Station here, which was agreed to.

The Governor was pleased to communicate to the Board, a Letter from the Bishop of London dated 21<sup>st</sup> September 1752 to the Rev<sup>d</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Thomas Dawson, directing and empowering him to act as Commissary.

The Board taking under Consideration the great Misfortune James Yates incurr'd by the Loss of his Right Arm in firing the Guns on his Majesty's Birth-Night, were of Opinion, and it was accordingly re-



solved, that a Salary of Fifteen pounds per Annum should be allowed him payable half yearly to himself for his Subsistence.

Ordered That a new Comission of the peace issue for Nancemond, and that William Moore and Daniel Pugh Gent be replaced.

Ordered That a new Commission of the peace issue for King William and that D<sup>r</sup> Campbell be put in his former place.

Ordered That Samuel Oldham and Augustine Washington be appointed Coroners for Westmoreland, Oldham for the parish of Cople, and Washington for the parish of Washington.

The Governor communicated to the Board a Letter from the Cataba Nation dated the 24<sup>th</sup> of November last wherein they return their hearty Thanks to his Honour for the timely Notice they received of the Designs of the French Indians, and signify that there is a lasting peace made between them and the Six Nations

Ordered That the Receiver General pay M<sup>r</sup> Henry Morris Thirty pounds for his Journey to the Cattabas.

Ordered That Jacob Walker Gent be permitted and impower'd to agree with M<sup>r</sup> White, for his living in the Dwelling House at the Fort at Hampton, the said White to repair the said House at his own Expence, and in Consideration thereof to be free from the payment of any Rent for the space of Four Years; provided if the Governor and Council shall at any Time hereafter disagree to his continuing in the House during that Time, he shall oblige himself to quit it, being allowed an adequate proportion towards his Disbursements in the Repairs.

William Fairfax Esq<sup>r</sup> reported that the Gentlemen appointed, had according to Order drawn up an Answer to the Letter from Cresap and Trent, which was read and approved, and in Substance as follows, Viz, That we don't think the Irregularities complained of against the Indians to be so threatning as they apprehend them; that they appear to have arisen from private Differences among the Indians and some Traders whom we suppose to be duly licenced, and think ought to apply to the Government from whence they had their Licences, and that those who have our Licence will not want our protection. That they seem to mistake our purpose in sending for the Indians to Winchester; it is not to hold a Treaty, but to deliver to them a present of Arms and Ammunition which we found they wanted. In Respect to the Dutchman, that, as the Charge against him amounts to a Felony, the Information against him should be upon Oath, on which if we can get him apprehended, it will be necessary for M<sup>r</sup> Cresap to appear with his proofs to

prosecute him at Williamsburg. Advising them to speak with Caution what they think on a Rupture between Us and the Indians, and to avoid giving just Occasion for such Event, as our Interest may perhaps, be more effectually secured by lenient Methods, than by violent Measures.

The Governor communicated to the Board a Letter from William Fairfax Esq<sup>r</sup> dated the 15<sup>th</sup> of May 1753 which he received by the Hands of M<sup>r</sup> Andrew Montour signifying a Resolution formed by the Governor of Canada to extend the French Settlements on the Branches of Mississippi, and to prevent our Trade, and that a formidable Number of French and their Indians appearing on the Ohio had so alarmed the Six Nations that he doubts whether the Indians expected will venture to Winchester, and that if they should not he will take due Care of the Goods.

M<sup>r</sup> Montour brought at the same Time an Answer from the Six Nations to his Honour's Message, wherein they promise to preserve the Covenant Chain bright and strong, and to oppose the Attempts of our Enemies, with two Belts of Wampum, which they desire may be returned at a future Meeting.

Whereupon it was the Advice of the Board, that his Honour would signify to Col Fairfax, that his Conduct is entirely approved of, and direct him to get all possible Information, relating to the Designs of the French and their Indians, also to procure and send a proper person to the General of the French Forces on the Ohio, to learn the Reason of his invading the Lands belonging to his Majesty of Great-Britain; Also that his Honour would by the Return of M<sup>r</sup> Montour inform the Six Nations by a Letter under his Hand and the seal of the Colony, that we are well pleased with their Assurances of Fidelity, and that they may depend on our Support to enable them to repel our Common Enemies, and to advise them to keep their young Warriors at Home, for Fear of a Surprize.

The Governor likewise laid before the Board a Copy of a Letter from the Governor of New York, to Governor Hamilton purporting

he had received Intelligence of an Army of French and Indians discovered by some of our Indians near a place called Sweganehey below Cadaraqui, by a Letter from Col Johnson, (a Copy whereof came inclosed) desiring Governor Hamilton to forward the Advice to the Governors of Maryland, Virginia and Carolina, that the Indians in Friendship with Us may be apprized of it.

These Advices were accompanied with a Letter from Governor Hamilton signifying the Necessity of giving our Allies some immediate Succour, with his Opinion that as soon as the Facts relating to these proceedings are duly proved, they should be transmitted to his Majesty's Ministers, that they may be able to form a true Judgment of the Conduct of the French and its Consequences. Also a paragraph of a Letter from M<sup>r</sup> William West to the Governors of pensylvania in Confirmation of the above Report.

Which Letters having been duly considered, the Council advised the Governor to return for Answer that this Government will be ready to give all possible Assistance to the Six Nations, and that we rely on their joint Support; to send Copies of the Letters from the Governors to the Governor of Carolina, and dispatch a Messenger immediately to the Cherokees and Catawbas that they may be on their Guard against the Designs of the French, and the Indians in Friendship with them, and prepared to defeat any Schemes they may have against them.

Ordered that the Receiver General pay M<sup>r</sup> Andrew Montour One Hundred and Twenty Five pounds for his Expences and Losses in going to and returning from the Six Nations.

Also a Letter from Cap<sup>t</sup> Trent giving an Account of an expected Invasion from the French, and representing the distress'd

Circumstances of the Six Nations, who without some speedy Assistance of Arms and Ammunition would fall into the Hands of the Enemy. Whereupon it is the Opinion of the Board that Col Fairfax be directed to deliver to Cap<sup>t</sup> Trent the Arms and Ammunition in his possession, or such part of them as shall be thought necessary to be by him conveyed in the most careful Manner to the Indians.

The Governor was pleased to communicate to the Board two Letters from William Fairfax Esq<sup>r</sup>, One of the 18<sup>th</sup> [*sic*] the other of the 19<sup>th</sup> [*sic*] Instant, purporting that according to his Honour's Orders he had prevailed on Col William Russell to go to Logstown, and had given him written Instructions (a Copy whereof was inclosed) to proceed there forthwith, and in the Governor of Virginia's Name to desire Admittance to the Commandant of the French Forces, and to demand by whose Commission and Authority he acts, the Reasons why his Forces together with the Indians under his Command have come from Canada so far Southward as the River Ohio to invade the Lands belonging to his Majesty of Great Britain, in a Time of profound peace; also to gain what Intelligence he can relating to the Designs of the French and their Indians; That he left the Arms &c in safe Custody; That he came from Winchester the 4<sup>th</sup> Instant to Belvoir, about

Eighty Miles distant from thence; that he can readily send any Commands he may receive, and depend on their being well executed.

On the petition of John Lewis Esq<sup>r</sup> and Company Four Years further Time is allowed them to compleat the surveying and seating their Grant of Eight Hundred Thousand Acres of Land lying on the Branches of Mississippi in Augusta County

The Governor communicated to the Board a Letter he received from M<sup>r</sup> William Trent, dated from North Branch Potomack the 28<sup>th</sup> June last, by Thomas Burney returned from the Twigtwees now at Ohio, signifying that he expected to be with the Indians the 1<sup>st</sup> of July, with a Message from the Half King, the Cheifs of the Six Nations, and Twigtwees, purporting their Dislike and Fear of the French coming amongst them, and their firm Attachment to their good Brothers the English. Whereupon it was the Advice of the Board,

that his Honour would signify to the Twigtwees, that in Consideration of their coming so long a Way to confirm the Friendship subsisting between us, and being fond of every Oportunity of testifying our Regard for them, we are preparing a small Present for them which will be sent to Winchester by the 20<sup>th</sup> of next Month, that we expect they will come there and accept it, as a Token of our Affection, and that in May next, we desire they will accompany the Sachems of the Six Nations to Winchester to receive a handsome Present sent by their Father the King of Great Britain

It was further advised by the Board that his Honour would assure the Six Nations we shall be always ready to assist them upon all necessary Occasions when in our Power, to invite them to come with the Twigtwees in May next, to accept his Majesty's Present, and to inform them, that a Suit of Cloaths will be sent for the Half King, and King Shinges, with the small Present to the Cheifs of the Twigtwees; Also that his Honour would request William Fairfax Esq<sup>r</sup> to deliver the said Present.

Ordered That the following Present be sent to the Twigtwees Viz: Two Barrels of Powder, Four Hundred weight of Lead, Twenty five small Arms, a Hundred Flints, two Peices of Match Coats, a Suit of Cloaths, and a Hat for each, also a Suit of Cloaths and a Hat for the Half King, and King Shinges.

Ordered That the Receiver General pay Thomas Burney Fifty Pounds for his Trouble and Expençe in going to and returning from the Twigtwees.

The Governor was pleased to communicate to the Board a Letter from M<sup>r</sup> William Trent dated August 11<sup>th</sup> purporting that the Indians were in Hopes of seeing his Honour, that the French, whose Army consists of about One Thousand five Hundred Soldiers from old France, within three Months will have three Forts on the Ohio River, that they declare publickly they will have all the Land as far as Allegheny Hill,

and will build Towns and Forts where they please; He is persuaded the Inclination of the Indians is at this Time with us.

Also a Letter from William Fairfax Esq<sup>r</sup> dated from Winchester the 19<sup>th</sup> of August, signifying he had just received a Letter from M<sup>r</sup> Trent intimating the great Desire of the Indians to see the Governor of Virginia, on whom they chiefly depend for immediate Assistance. He thinks a Commission appointing Cap<sup>t</sup> Trent to command a Body of Rangers may be of service; he expects the Indians in Number between Thirty and Forty about the 27<sup>th</sup> Instant who will at least stay till advised of his Honour's coming or not, to which was added a Post-script of the next Day, informing that M<sup>r</sup> Gist came that Day, and, tho told M<sup>r</sup> Birney was set off with Cap<sup>t</sup> Trent's Letters, was willing to undertake a Journey to Williamsburg himself, believing he could be more explicit in giving Satisfaction in what related to the present Affairs of the Indians, which he did not disapprove of; That a greater Number of Indians being on their March than expected he desired an Order for some Cash, not knowing of whom to get it, and beg'd his Honour's fullest Instructions in Case of his not coming.

Whereupon it was the Advice of the Council, that a Hundred Pounds be sent by M<sup>r</sup> Gist to Col: Fairfax; that he be directed to satisfy the Indians it is impossible for the Governor to meet them at this Time; to assure them of his Regard for them; that he fully intends to meet them at Winchester next Summer with a handsome Present from his Majesty, and to fix a Time, the most suitable to them. They also advise his Honour to transmit to Col Fairfax the Substance of the Answers he has received to his Message to the Cherokees and Catawbas, that he may be enabled to convince the Indians how hearty the Southard Indians are to oppose the Settlement of the French on the Ohio, or any of their hunting Grounds, and to desire him to let them know, that if they should engage in War with their Enemies, and think fit to put their Women and Children under our Protection, all proper Care will be taken of them, and further to signify to him, if a fit Person could be procured to send to the Commandant of the French Forces, a Commission would be granted him to demand by what Authority he invades the Lands of his Majesty's Subjects of Great Britain, while a firm Peace subsists between the two Crowns, but that no Commission can be sent for Rangers or other Forces, till an Answer shall come from England to Letters praying Directions in the Case.

His Majesty's Warrant countersigned by the Lords of the Treasury bearing Date the 9<sup>th</sup> Day of April 1753 was this Day read at the Board appointing an Allowance of Six Hundred pounds per Annum, out of the Revenue of two shillings a Hogshead to the Members of his Majesty's Council, in Addition to their former annual Allowances, to commence from the last half yearly Day of Payment.

A Copy of an Order of the King in Council, bearing Date the tenth Day of May 1753 and certified by Peter Leheup Esq<sup>r</sup> was produced and read, for the Lords of the Treasury to cause a proper Warrant to be prepared for authorizing the payment of a Sum of Money not exceeding One Thousand Pounds to be laid out in Goods for a Present to the Twigtwee Indians and their Allies.

The Governor desiring the Advice of the Board concerning the most proper Time for the Meeting of the Assembly, on Consideration thereof, it is the Opinion of the Board and accordingly ordered that the Assembly which stood prorogued to the second Tuesday in November next, meet the first Thursday of the said Month, and that Proclamations forthwith issue requiring their Attendance at that Time for the Dispatch of Business.

The Governor was pleased to communicate to the Board a Packet he received by his Majesty's Ship the Speedwell containing a Letter from the Lords of Trade signifying their Approbatio[n]<sup>155</sup> of his Honour's Conduct with Respect to Indian Affairs, and of the Means he recommended to be taken towards checking the Designs of the French on the Ohio, and for the Maintenanc[ce]<sup>156</sup> of his Majesty's Rights, and the Interests and Security of his Subjects in America, which they had sent to the Secretary of State to be laid before the King.

Also his Majesty's Order in Council of the 10<sup>th</sup> of Augus[t]<sup>157</sup> last, that the Board of Ordnance be directed to send Thirty Cannon of Four Pounders to be placed in Forts which his Majesty approved to have erected on the River Ohio as soon as the Nature of the Service will admit, with a full Proportion of Stores.

Also his Majesty's Instructions of the 28<sup>th</sup> of the said Month directing his Honour in Case the Subjects of any foreign Prince or State should presume to make any Incroachments on the Limits of his Majestys Dominions, or to erect Forts on his Lands, or commit any Other Act of Hostility, immediately to represent the Injustice of such Proceeding, and to require them forthwith to desist from any such unlawful Undertaking But if notwithstanding such Requisition, they should still persist, his Honour is then directed to draw forth the armed Force of the Province, and use his best Endeavours to repel Force by Force, but by no means to make use of the armed Force excepting within the Limits of his Majesty's Dominions. His Honour is further enjoin'd to keep up an exact Correspondence with all the Governors on the Continent and in case he shall be informed by any of them, of any hostile Attempts, to assemble the General Assembly, and lay before them the Necessity of a mutual Assistance, and engage them to grant such Supplies as the Exigencies of Affairs may require.

The Governor communicated a Letter to the Board from M<sup>r</sup> William Trent date October 5<sup>th</sup> 1753 purporting that he was credibly informed all the Traders were preparing to remove from Yougyougane by Advice of the Half King who was returned from the French Army much displeas'd with the Treatment he received from the Commander, who used many insolent Expressions and Menaces to him against the English. M<sup>r</sup> Trent says the Half King is the best Friend the English have, but fears a great Part of the Six Nations favour the French, and doubts all the Setlers on the Ohio Company's Lands will be oblig'd to move off if the Governor don't fall on some Method speedily to stop the progress of the French.

Sir,

As I have the Honour of commanding here in Cheif, M<sup>r</sup> Washington deliver'd me the Letter you writ to the Commandant of the French Troops. I should have been glad that you had given him Orders, or that he had been inclined to procede to Canada to see our General, to whom it better belongs, than to me, to set forth the Evidence, and Reality of the Rights of the King my Master, upon the Lands situated along the River Ohio, and to contest the pretentions of the King of Great Britain thereto.

I shall transmit your Letter to the Marquis Duquisne, his Answer will be a Law to me; and if he shall order me to communicate it to you, Sir, you may be assured I shall not fail to dispatch it to you forthwith.

As to the Summons you send me to retire, I don't think myself obliged to obey it, whatever may be your Instructions, I am here by Virtue of the Orders of my General; and I intreat you, Sir, not to doubt one Moment, but that I am determin'd to conform myself to them, with all the Exactness and Resolution which can be expected from the best Officer.

I don't know that in the Progress of this Campaign, any Thing has passed which can be reputed an Act of Hostility, or that is con-

trary to the Treaties which now subsist between the two Crowns, the Continuation whereof as much interests, and is as pleasing to us as the English.

Had you been pleased, Sir, to have descended to particularize the Facts which occasion'd your Complaint, I should have had the Honour of answering you in the fullest, and, I am persuaded, most satisfactory Manner. I made it my particular Care to receive Major Washington with a Distinction suitable to your Dignity, and his Quality, and great Merit; I flatter myself he will do me this Justice before you, Sir, and that he will signify to you, as well as I, the profound Respect with which I am,

On Consideration whereof it was the Opinion of the Board, that it will be sufficient at present for his Honour to order a Draught of One Hundred Men out of the Militia in the Counties of Frederick, and Augusta; and their Advice that the cheif Command be given to Major Washington, and a Captain's Commission to M<sup>r</sup> William Trent to raise what Traders and other Men he can to annoy the Enemy; That M<sup>r</sup> John Carlyle be appointed Commissary of Provisions; and that the Commanding Officer be directed to proceed immediately to the Defence of our Settlements on the Ohio: they further advised the Governor to call the Assembly in order to raise a greater Force to oppose the Designs of the French. Upon a Motion made, the Council took into Consideration the Bill passed by the House of Burgesses, and depending before the upper House; intituled, "An Act for the Encouragement and protection of the Settlers upon the Waters of the Mississippi." and observing many Things in the said Bill to be unconstitutional, and derogatory to the Prerogative of the Crown, especially that Part of the Bill, which gives the Power of directing the Application of the Money to be raised by the said Bill to a Committee therein named, among whom are several Members of this Board contrary to their Consent and Inclination, and desired to be informed by his Honour the Governor, whether he thought he could, consistently with his

Duty to his Majesty, give his Assent to the Bill, the Governor concurs with the Council unanimously, that the Bill contains some Clauses of dangerous Consequence, as tending towards an Alteration of a fundamental Part of the Constitution, by taking from his Honour an undoubted Right he has of directing the Application of all Monies raised for the Defence and Security of the Country; and that nothing less than a Case of the most pressing Necessity can in any Manner justify or even excuse him for agreeing to such a Bill. Yet seeing the Importance of an immediate Supply to defeat the Designs of the French upon our Frontiers is the most pressing that can be suggested; and considering that if this Government neglects to do something effectual this Summer towards the protecting and securing that Part of the Colony, all future Attempts for that End will be rendered unsuccessfull and there being no other possible Means by which this so desirable a Purpose can be effected, but by the Assistance of the Money granted by the said Bill, his Honour is of Opinion with the Board, that the extrem Necessity of the Service, and the fatal Consequence of neglecting it, may in some Sort only justify him for giving his Assent to the Bill.

Thomas Nelson Esq<sup>r</sup> Reported that the Gentlemen Appointed had drawn up Reasons for judging his Majesties Additional Instruction relative to Appeals incongruous with the Laws and Circumstances of this Colony which were read and Approved and his Honour the Governor was desired to represent the same to his Majesty.

Also a Letter from Governor Shirley confirming the same Signifying withal the Importance of that River to the French as well as English, it affording the Shortest Passage of any River in the Atlantick Ocean for the French and their Indians to make Incursions upon us from Canada, and for us to March to Quebec': in which Letter was inclosed an Extract of a Letter sent him by one Thomas Smith who resided in Canada near Quebec' at the Time of the French Armaments being raised; as also a Copy of a Declaration of John Patten Trader among the Indians to the Westward of the Apalachcan Mountains containing an Account of the Line of Forts which the French had upon the Ohio and Lakes, at the Commencement of the late War, and of their Policy in the Manner of erecting them.

His Majesties Confirmation of An Act of Assembly to Dock the Intail of certain Lands whereof David Garland is Seised and for settling other Lands and Slaves of greater Value to the same Uses, was produced, and Ordered to be recorded in the Secretaries Office.

The Governor Communicated to the Board a Letter dated the Nineteenth Day of April from the Governor of New York advising that some French Deserters mentioned in a Letter inclosed from the Commanding Officer at Oswego say that the French talked of sending Three or Four Thousand Men this Spring from Canada to reinforce the Settlements and building a Stone Fort on the Ohio to the Westward also that his Assembly have granted One Thousand Pounds for the Transportation of the two Companies, and Subsisting them with Six Months Provisions, whom the Station Ship would be ready to take on Board in a Fortnight; and that he presumes the Companies will be Accommodated with every thing Necessary for their March on their Arrival in Virginia at his Majesties, or the Expence of this Government; in which Letter was inclosed a Resolution of the Assembly concerning the Building of Forts in the Countries of the Six Nations.

His Honour was likewise pleased to Communicate a Letter from the Governor of Maryland of the 25<sup>th</sup> of April signifying he had received a Letter from the Governor of New York wherein he proposes as the most effectual Step to Secure the Friendship of the Six Nations that the Neighbouring Provinces will join in Advancing a Sum of Money towards erecting Forts among those Indians; and that he shall urge that Proposal to his Assembly.

The Governor Communicated to the Board a Letter he had received by M<sup>r</sup> Edward Ward Ensign to Captain Trents Company dated the 25<sup>th</sup> of April at Willis's Creek, advising that the Fort on the River Ohio was the 17<sup>th</sup> of that Instant surrendered at the Summons of the French Commandant in Chief Contrecoeur, to a Body of French consisting of upward of One Thousand Men with a Copy inclosed of the Resolve of a Council of War held thereupon, to advance as far as Red Stone Creek about thirty seven Miles above the Fort, and there Fortify themselves clearing the Road as they March out, for the Carriage of their Artillery & Baggage and there wait the arrival of Col. Fry, and what Forces are to join them, Ensign Ward accompanied by an Indian, and an Interpreter, appeared in the Council Chamber, and produced the Original Summons he Received in the Absence of his Captain and Lieutenant; and a Speech from the half King at the Fort on Ohio to his Honour, desiring to know where we were, what was our Strength, and the Time they might Expect our Forces to join them. The Governor also communicated a Letter from Col. Fry dated at Alexandria the 30<sup>th</sup> of April, Advising he should set off the next Morning with five Waggons & a Cart, and leave a small Party to take care of others that he had been detained hitherto by the want of Carriages.

Whereupon it was the Advice of the Board that his Honour would Signifie by a Letter to Col. Washington that his Conduct in General

has been approved of, more particularly the Caution he has taken in halting at Red Stone Creek, til they have Assembled a Sufficient Body to secure themselves & Cannon, and then to proceed to Monongahela.

They also advise his Honour in his Answer to the Half Kings Speech to Assure him we are sending many Forces out whom they may expect Very soon, to support and Protect Them, to desire him to be strong and not fear; and that our Forces shall join him and all the Indians which they can gather together at the Forks of the Road.

The Accounts of Contingent Charges from the 25<sup>th</sup> of October 1753 to the 25<sup>th</sup> of April 1754 and for Repairs to the Governor's House being laid before the Board were allowed.

The Governor signifying his Intention of setting off for Winchester on Monday Sen'night, and his Desire that some Gentlemen of the Council would Accompany him, William Fairfax, Richard Corbin and Philip Ludwell Esq<sup>rs</sup> very readily offered themselves, with the Approbation of the Board.

And if they Shall be transported from hence to any other place where their Service may be required, his Majesty is pleased to give them this Assurance that they Shall receive their due Share of any Booty that may be taken from the Enemy; And when Such Service is over be Sent back hither unless they Desire to Settle else where. And all Persons so Disposed to Serve his Majesty are Forthwith to repair to Williamsburgh and upon their Application to me, and being Listed they Shall immediately enter into his Majesty's pay. And in Case of Such Transportation as aforesaid, alth'o his Majesty will be at the Expence of Finding them Provisions, and Providing all other Necessaries for that purpose, Every person So Listed Shall receive two Guineas as his Majesty's bounty when he Embarks.

Whereas many Idle and dissolute Persons who neither betake themselves to any honest Labour or Employment nor have any Settled Habitation or place of abode Strole about the Country Unmolested; Some of them going about begging and others Frequenting the Several Court Houses of this Colony on the respective Court Days and other places of Public Meeting on purpose to Sollicit and draw in unwary People to unlawfull Gaming, thereby Defrauding them of Considerable Sums of Money to the Utter Ruine and Impovrishment of many of his Majesty's good Subjects; And others Likely to become Burthensome to the Parish are hired entertained or Employed without having first Produced a Certificate From the Sheriff of the County, or the Church Wardens or Collectors of the Parish Levy, From whence they Came that they have paid Levie there for the proceeding Year or of their being Servants at the time of, or Coming into the Colony, Since the taking the last List of Tythables; Contrary to an act of the General Assembly of this Dominion in the First Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the first in that Case made and provided I have therefore thought fit by and with the Advice of his Majesty's Council of State by this Proclamation in his Majesty's Name Strictly to Charge and enjoyn all Justices of the Peace Mayors of Corporations Sherifs Constables, and other his Majesty's Officers and Ministers of Justice That they fail not to Apprehend or Cause or procure to be apprehended all Such Idle and dissolute Persons to the End they may be Dealt with as the Said Act directs; hereby requiring the Several Persons appointed to Act for the Kings most Excellent Majesty in the respective County Courts of this Colony duly to prosecute by Information or otherwise all Offenders against the Said Act or any other Act of the General Assembly of this Dominion made Concerning Vagrants To the intent that the Laws being duly put in Execution Such disorders may be Effectually reformed.

And if any Person or Persons whatsoever Shall presume to harbour entertain or Conceal any Deserter or promote or Contrive his Escape the person or persons So offending Shall be prosecuted with the Utmost Severity of the Law, And for Encouragement to all his Majesty's Loving Subjects to Use their Utmost Endeavours to apprehend and Secure Deserters, Any Person or Persons upon producing to me Such Certificate as aforesaid Shall for every Deserter by him or them apprehended receive a Pistole reward; And I do hereby Strictly Charge and Command all Justices of the Peace Mayors of Corporations Sherifs Constables and others his Majesty's Loving Subjects That they be further aiding and assisting in the premisses as Need or Occasion Shall be or require.

And I do Appoint this proclamation to be read and published at the Court-houses Church[es]<sup>175</sup> and Chapels in each respective County within this Colony; And that the Sherifs take care the same be done accordingly

An Act for allowing Fairs to be kept in the Town of Suffolk; and preventing Hogs and Goats going at large therein; and for altering the Times of holding Fairs in the Town of Newcastle.

Whereas the General Assembly stands prorogued to the last Thursday in October Instant: And whereas I find no urgent Occasion for the said Assembly's Meeting at that Time; I have therefore thought fit, by this Proclamation, in His Majesty's Name, to prorogue the said Assembly to the Third Thursday in April next; and the said Assembly is hereby prorogued accordingly.

A Proclamation.<sup>203</sup>

Whereas it is determined that a Fort be immediately built on the River Ohio, at the Fork of Monongahela, to oppose any further Encroachments or hostile Attempts of the French, and the Indians in their Interest, & for the Security and Protection of his Majesty's Subjects in this Colony; and as it is absolutely necessary that a Sufficient Force should be raised to erect & support the same: For an Encouragement to all who shall voluntarily enter into the said Service, I do hereby notify & promise, by and with the Advice & Consent of his Majesty's Council of this Colony, that over & above their Pay—200000 Acres of his Majesty the King of Great Britain's Lands, on the East Side of the River Ohio, within this Dominion (one hundred thousand Acres whereof to be contiguous to the said Fort, & the other 100000 Acres to be on, or near the River Ohio) shall be laid off & granted to such Persons, who by their voluntary Engagement & good Behaviour in the said Service, shall deserve the same.

And I further promise, that the said Lands shall be divided amongst them immediately after the Performance of the said Service, in a Proportion due to their respective Merit, as shall be represented to me by their Officers; and held & enjoyed by them without paying any Rights, & also free from the Payment of Quitrents for the Term of 15 Years.
